Benton, Cuba City Meet in Title Battle

(Special to the Journal) BENTON, Wis.—Functioning in machine-like fashion, Cuba City's undefeated Southwest Wisconsin conference title and Benton's crack Blackhawk league champions turned in impressive victories Friday night's semi-finals to earn the right to meet tonight at 9 o'clock for the championship of the Benton class C district high school basketball tournament; Cuba City is a top-heavy favorite to win the title.

With its high-scoring center, Kenny Coch, scoring 18 points, Coach Guerdon Brewer's Cuba City team vanquished New Diggins with ease, 39-22. Benton advanced with a 20-13 win over Belmont, a team it had beaten twice during the regular season.

Hazel Green meets South Wayne for consolation honors tonight at 7 o'clock as a result of its easy, 31-11, win over Rewey Friday night, and Belmont and New Diggins clash for third place at 8 o'clock. Hazel Green limited Rewey to two field goals and led easily throughout their game. Joe Nolte was high scorer with 11 points for the victors.

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Stoughton Wins, 35-23

Paul Christopher and Bob Nyhagen, Stoughton defeated its traditional rival, Edgerton, 35-23, in a typical Edgerton-Stoughton game here Friday night. A season record crowd of 850 people jammed the small Edgerton gym to watch the two teams perform in their last Southern conference tilt of the season.

Stoughton holds undisputed second place in the final league standings. Stoughton got off to early start and held a 9-4 lead at the quarter. Both teams played on even terms during the next two periods, each scoring 12 points, in the final quarter five players inserted into the fray by Coach Ray Myrick contributed to the scoring column for a total of 12 points.

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Bloomington High Cagers Repeat as District Titlist

(Lancaster Journal News Service) LANCASTER, Wis.—Bloomington, champion of the West Grant County league, defeated Patch Grove, runner-up in the same circuit, by a score of 28-9 here Friday to win the Lancaster district high school class C basketball tournament; it was the second straight year Bloomington had annexed that honor.

Highland defeated Potosi, 17-14, to gain third place, and consolation honors went to Wauzeka which trimmed Mt. Hope, 20-11. The final games were witnessed by a good sized crowd despite bad weather.

Bloomington's victory in the championship finals this year was achieved with far less effort than a year ago when it defeated Highland on the basis of free throws after two overtime periods had failed to break a deadlock.

The champions jumped into an early lead and were never headed; at the end of five minutes Bloomington's margin was only 8-4, but it stepped up the pace to take an 11-4 lead at the quarter. Bloomington led, 14-7, at the half and outscored Patch Grove by a 14-2 margin after the intermission.

In addition to winning the championship, Bloomington placed two boys, Fessenden and Wright, on the all-tournament team; the other three selections were W. Monroe of Patch Grove, Benish of Highland and Brown of Wauzeka, the latter being named captain. Pomeroying of Wauzeka was named as the most valuable player to his team, and Mt. Hope was voted the sportsmanship award.

Highland gained third place by virtue of some fast play in the first half during which it piled up a 15-9 lead. Potosi rallied in the second half and outscored Highland 5-2, but it couldn't close the gap. Highland's margin might have been more decisive if it had been more accurate from the free throw line where it missed 13 out of 16 attempts.

Wauzeka had a 13-2 margin over Mt. Hope at the half and was never in serious trouble even though outscored in the last two quarters. High individual scorer of the final night was Slaats, Bloomington guard, who tallied 13 points on five baskets and three free throws. The summaries:
