State Joins Kansas Child

Wisconsin will join the federal government in asking that the U. S. supreme court uphold Kansas' disputed ratification of the child labor amendment, Atty. Gen. Orland S. Loomis advised U. S. Solicitor General Robert H. Jack-

son in a letter today.

Loomis informed Jackson would either file a brief on behalf of Wisconsin, or will join in the government's brief.

With the lieutenant governor breaking the tie, the Kansas legislature ratified the amendment in 1937. The high court this week granted the petition of 24 Kansas legislators, asking for review of a state supreme court decision up-holding that ratification.

The legislators contended first that the lieutenant governor lacked power to break a tie vote, and second, that since the amendment had been rejected by the legislature in 1924 it could not be considered again. The Kansas court held the legislature could reconsider its 1924 vote and approve

the amendment.
"The state of Wisconsin, whose legislature ratified the amendment in 1925 is vitally interested in the outcome of this case", though the fight against child labor has been won in Wisconsin for many years, we would not be true to the traditions of Wisconsin if we did not at this time do our part to carry on this fight until it is won for the rest of the nation.'

The child labor amendment has wires running out of it and 10 or been ratified by 28 states, with 36 20 knobs and a lot of little levers states in all, needed to put it into the constitution.

Fair Management? Here's An Answer

(This is the fifth and final article in a teries explaining the county-wide referendum on the question: "Shall the Dane county Beard of Supervisers Provide for and Conduct a Fair." These articles have been prepared by a group of public spirited citizens in an effort to inform the voters of Madion and of Dane county on all phases of the question.—Editor's note)

The special fair investigating committee gave special attention to this matter of management; for while it openly advocated and recommended that Dane county assume the operation of the fair, at the same time the committee realized that without proper man-agement the fair would be doomed to failure.

In a supplementary report the committee recommended a fair commission or board of nine members, elected at the November meeting of the county board, and chosen as follows: Five supervisors—two each

Depression to Let Up, Survey Shows

BOSTON-(U.R)-A survey of 19 business depressions in the United States since 1857 "shows quite clearly that the present decline ... has now gone about as far as usually experienced even in peri-ods of severe depression," the American Institute of Finance reported today.

"The current decline . . . has already exceeded in extent the declines seen in all previous periods of minor and moderately severe depression," the report said. Excluding the 1929-33 depression, which was due to a combination of factors not now present, the average decline in the preceding nine severe depressions has been 31 per cent, compared with the current decline of 30 per cent.

"In such previous depressions" the report said, business declined to between 77 and 82 per cent of normal, compared with the present level of 77.7 per cent.

Court Denies Plea to Dismiss Risk Case
