Fauerbach's Celebrates 90th Year

An industry that started when Madison was only about a decade old this week is celebrating its 90th anniversary. The oldest business in the city except The Wisconsin State Journal, the Fauerbach Brewing Co., moreover, has been in control of the same family and has been located at the same place ever since it started out with a wash house, a few horse barns, and a family dwelling as the only equipment.

How It Has Grown The plant was situated then far from the center of the city's business activity. Now it is in the heart of a congested industrial district in the 600 block of Williamson st.

And now it has the newest types of machinery, a fleet of motor trucks, and more than 80 full time employees, 100 per cent unionized. Peter Fauerbach founded the company in 1848 and operated the brewery until his death on April 12, 1886. Then his five sons took over the business.

The oldest, Louis, in turn was father of the five Fauerbach sons now actively engaged in running the business. Brothers in Business The brothers in the business now are Karl H., president; William J., master brewer and director; Fred W., Louis and Walter, all directors.

All members of the family have been lifelong residents of Madison. A severe epidemic swept among Madison horses in 1872 and necessitated use of oxen to make deliveries and carry on work at the plant. For before 1890, when power-driven machinery was introduced, horses were used for water pumping, grinding, and elevation of malt.
