"Unusual flexibility and almost constant employment of facilities were required by the joint use of Madison's 60,000 population and the 11,000 students of the university. Seating capacity of the large auditorium may be varied from 700 to 1,300 by drawing curtains. The laboratory theater, seating 185 persons, accommodates experimental work in speech stage technique, cinema projection, radio rehearsal, and broadcasting. Observation, viewing and projection rooms, occupying lab-oratory theater balcony, permit class discussion of performance in progress. Stages, shops, and the-aters, being interrelated and keyed to student and civic activities, result in economic initial costs; maintenance charges may be reasonably apportioned."
