PROF. C. E. BRICKEN

The chief interest in life for Prof. Carl E. Bricken is music. And that is as should be, for this fall Prof. Bricken takes over the chairmanship of the music department at the University of

Prof. Bricken, young and enthusiastic, is the former head of Chicago university music school whose appointment at Wisconsin caused such a serious student-faculty controversy last spring. But despite his lack of musical degrees, to which the students objected, Prof. Bricken has "arrived" in his field. A Pulitzer prize and a Guggenheim fellowship are proof of that.

Bricken was graduated from Yale in 1922 with a B. A., still the only degree he has. After that he attended the David Mannes school of music in New York for two years.

"I've always had music." Prof. Bicken says, "but after I

finished college I really went in for it seriously."

In 1924 Bricken went abroad to continue his studies. For a year he was a pupil of Alfred Cortot, the greatest living French pianist, in Paris. And from 1923 to 1929 he studied composition under Rosarao Sclero, now head of the theory department at Curtis Institute. In 1937 and 1928 he taught at the Institute of Musical Art in New York.

In 1929 Bricken won the Pulitzer prize with a composition for a string quartet. That year he spent in Vienna studying with Hans Weisse, chief exponent of Heinrich Schenker. His prizewinning composition was played in Vienna that year, too.
