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

Nazi Art, Reich Must Blend, Says Hitler

BERLIN-(INS)-Inaugurating the second exhibition of architecture and handicraft at Munich, Chancellor Hitler Saturday championed a new rennaissance in German art.

At the same time, the fuehrer indicated that completion of Germany's western fortifications is imminent and announced that the hundreds of thousands of workers at present employed in construction of these huge defense works will soon return to normal conscription work.

Hitler declared the Art Rennaissance would be marked by distinctive Nazi traits such as mass effect and dimensions of uniform style.

"Art and the third reich must have a unanimous character," Hitler said, "so that future epochs immediately will recognize these works as belonging to our period."






