In Wisconsin summer eagles are likely to be bald eagles and winter eagles are more likely to be golden eagles as the bird rarely remains through the winter.

The golden eagle ranges through the mountainous regions from northern Alaska and northwestern Mackenzie south to northern Lower California, central Mexico, western Texas and formerly to North Carolina. It breeds in suitable places throughout its range and winters in the southern portions of it.

The golden eagle does not breed in Wisconsin as far as is known. It is usually un-

common but is found through-out the state during the fall,

winter and spring months.
Its food consists of all sizes of mammals from fawns to rabbits, woodchucks, gophers, mice, lambs and calves and larger wild birds. It is never numerous enough in Wisconsin to do much damage.

The golden eagle has been called the "finest and noblest" of the birds of prey found in Wisconsin.

the world. Sixty-four per cent of those vot-ing in the annual United Press poll said "yes" in answer to this ques-tion: "Are you in favor of a national ezar to control boxing?" Thirty-three per cent said "no" and the remainder were non-com-

If such a plan went into effect, all the editors agreed, the man who took the job would have to be a vise, tolerant, firm, honest and tircless worker.

"He would have to be a second Solomon," was the phrase voiced n many of the replies.

Tunney was mentioned most often as the man closest to all the requirements. Jack Dempsey's name appeared on several ballots. Among those who favored na-tional one-man control was Parke Carroll of the Kansas City Journal who wrote:

"Yes, there should be a national czar. Boxing is the sick child of professional sport and only through stern measures will confidence be restored. Outside of New York. boxing as a major activity has ceased to exist." Sec Taylor, sports editor of the Des Moines Register, wrote:

"I do not favor mixing sports of any kind with politics. It's bad enough now. I refer to state commissions.'' The opinion was almost unanim-

ous that the squabbles between the National Boxing Association and the New York commission are injurious to the sport. One ballot suggested that it would take a 'federal man' to straighten out the tangle. R. G. Lynch of the Milwaukee

Journal was among those who did not think a national exarship could be made practicable. He said:


