A PURITAN IN BABYLON. By William Allen White—The MacMillan Company—\$3.50.

White here explains Calvin Coolidge in terms of his New England background and in terms of the world history of which he was a somewhat bewildered part. It is rich reading for anyone interested in the American political scene, in the Coolidge hours, or in the odd way by which a speaker, conservative, cautious man could with the help of luck, history, and a good political team become president of the United States. It is a vivid, brilliant piece of characterization. William Allen White is editor of The Imporia Gazette and a widely known commentator on politics and national affairs.

Here are 25 detective stories by various authors which have never before been printed in any anthology. The compiler's "challenge" lies in the fact that he has changed the names of the detectives and challenges the reader to guess author and detective. It is at once a clever stunt book and an anthology of stories that is extremely good.

When Jeanette Marks, who is a Mount Holyoke professor, began her study of Elizabeth Barrett Browning she had the usual point of view of father complex and tuberculosis. But she was not content with the legends of Wimpole Street so she went to the island of Jamaica where for so many generations the Barrett family had great plantations. "All these generations of the Barrett family in Jamaica had been leading up to Elizabeth Barrett whose temperament was Creole and whose life was curious and deeply embedded in the history of the island. This is a new interpretation of the poetess and a complete reevaluation of her father. Entire new lines of thought have been opened and new records uncovered.

I HAVE BEEN HERE BEFORE

By J. B. Priestley. Harper and Brothers—\$2.00.

Six people meet in a small York-shire inn and over all of them hangs a sense of impending doom. One of them knows that when last these six met—in a previous cycle—a tragedy occurred which wrecked all their lives and it will happen again unless somehow fate can be forestalled. With the stage thus set, Priestley builds up his theme that life constantly repeats
