In a Nutshell

WHO? Every single person or married person not living with husband or wife who had net income of \$1,000 or more or gross income of \$5,000 or more, and generally, husband and wife living together, who had an aggregate net income of \$2,500 or more or an aggregate gross income of \$5,000 or more must file returns. If in doubt, obtain form and printed instructions from collector of internal revenue.

WHEN? The filing period begins January 1 and ends March 15, 1938.

WHERE? Collector of internal revenue for the district in which the person lives or has his principal place of business.

HOW? See instructions accom-

Income Tax Don'ts

DON'T prepare your raturn without first studying the instructions accompanying the form.

DON'T procrastinate. Early assembling of data permits a careful consideration of all tax problems.

DON'T destroy the memoranda from which your return was prepared.

DON'T omit explanation when such information is essential to an intelligent audit. Attach memoranda te your return.

port. For example, a widower who a credit of \$400 for each dependent, a total of \$3,300. The \$400 credit, however, does not apply to the wife or husband of a taxpayer, though one may be totally depend-

ent upon the other. Several factors are involved in determining whether a person who files a return as the head of a family is to be thus classified. The element of either legal or financial dependency must exist. A taxpayer who supports in his home minor children over whom he exercises family control is classified as the head of a family even though the children may have an income of their own sufficient for their maintenance. If he does not support them, by reason of their own income, but does exercise family control, he cannot be classified as the head of a family.

If an individual supported is an adult and there rests upon the taxpayer a moral or legal obligation to provide a home and care for such individual, the exemption as the head of a family is allowed, provided the individual is financially dependent. If the individual is not financially dependent, the exemption, even though the taxpayer maintains the common home

Workmen's Claims on Decline

Workmen's compensation claims declined 18.9 per cent during the past year from the 1937 level, the state industrial commission disclosed today. It settled only 20,383 cases in 1938 as compared with 25,-

140 in 1937. The commission explained that there was a greater proportional reduction in the number of compensation claims than in the number of workers discharged during 1938 as compared with 1937. Cost \$4,695,493

The 20,383 claims settled in 1938 cost \$4,695,493 in benefits paid to injured workers or their dependent survivors. This amount covers \$3,-516,612 for wage loss indemnity, and \$1,178,881 for medical ex-

The commission called attention to the fact that its settled cases include only 129 death claims as compared with 193 in 1937; eight permanent total disability cases as compared with 12 in 1937; 1,887 permanent partial disability as compared with 22.967 in 1937.

45 Lost Eyes Permanent partial disabilities included: 45 who lost one or both eyes; one lost one ear; 13 lost one arm; two lost one hand; seven lost one leg; three lost one foot; 420 lost one or more fingers; 34 lost

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
