Women's Western Open Goes Into Quarter-Finals
ST. LOUIS—(U.P.)—The Women's Western Open golf tournament entered the quarter-finals today with its 1938 champion, Beatrice Barrett of Minneapolis, seeking to retain her title, but without the tournament medalist, and without the 1938 runner-up.
Miss Barrett advanced Wednesday by defeating Mrs. Charles Harting, St. Louis, two and one. Today she met Phyllis Buchanan of Denver.
The tournament medalist, Mrs. Opal Hill, Kansas City professional and a favorite, was eliminated when she lost to Shirley Johnson of Chicago, former western junior champion, one up.
Helen Hofmann of Salt Lake City, most powerful driver in the tournament and runner-up last year, fell by the wayside, losing four and three, to Helen Dettweiler, professional from Washington, D. C.
The first match today was between Miss Johnson and Miss Hofmann. Each received a university course seem simple led 32 golfers today into match play in the western junior tournament.
David Osler, obscured by more famous golfing names, drove out a 74 in the qualifying round to tie Chase Fannon, Big Ten conference individual champion from Northwestern, for medalist honors. Osler had two 37's, two over par, while Fannon had to earn three birdies on the last nine to keep up with him. Each received a gold watch.
Two for second honors were two of the favorites, Drew Eggleston, Michigan junior champion from Detroit, and John Holstrom, Rockford, Ill., who won the western in 1937. Both shot 76.
Art Andrews, Jr., of Peoria, Ill., was in third place with a 78.
