Two New Stars, Walter Huston And Roland Young, Will Be Heard As Show Returns To Air Thursday

Ten of America's outstanding composers of popular music will be commissioned to write as many classical pieces for presentation on the "Good News of 1940" program when it returns to the air Thursday, over WLW at 8 p. m.

Billie Burke will be a guest performer on the first show, which will introduce two new Good News stars—Walter Huston and Roland Young—as well as a new regularly featured singer, Connie Boswell.

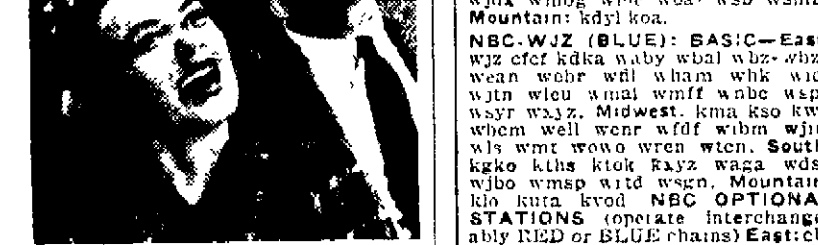
Connie Boswell's singing will mark the world premiere of "Lullies in the Rain," which is the "second movement" of the original piano composition, "Deep Purple."

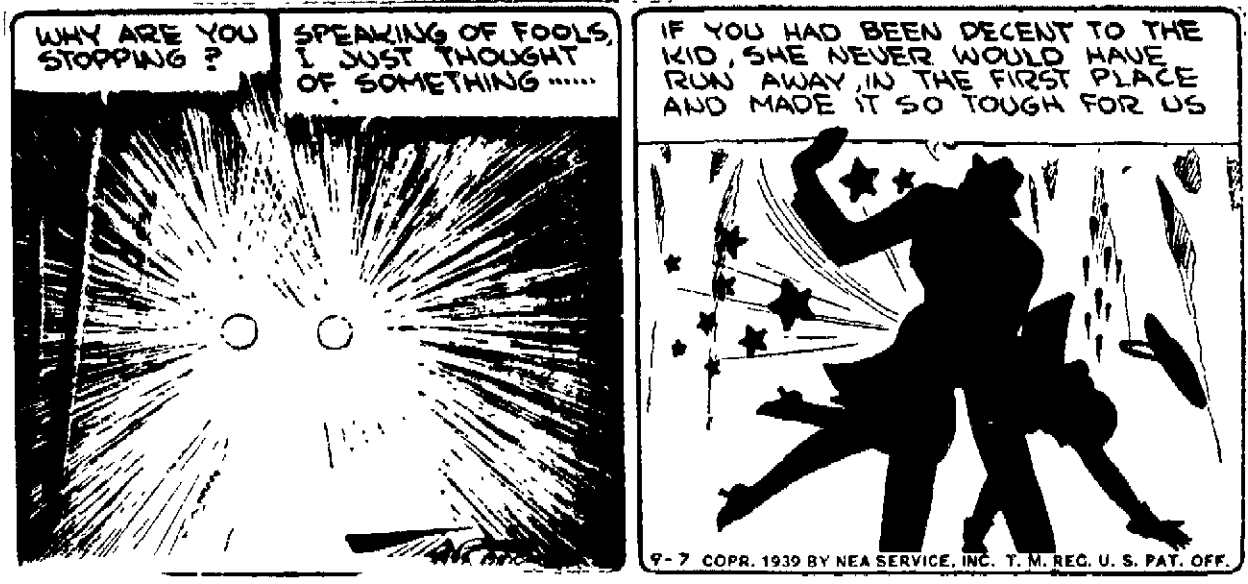

Tommy Ryan Is Starring In Hit Film At Lyric Friday

"Mickey The Kid" and "New Frontier" Provide New Double Bill With Many Favorites

Virile drama comes to the Lyric screen Friday when "Mickey the Kid" has its first Lima showing. The picture stars Tommy Ryan, Bruce Cabot, and Ralph Byrd, and in the cast are Jessie Ralph and Zazu Pitts.

"The Streets of New York" with Jackie Cooper, and "Little Pal," with Mickey Rooney, in the starring roles, end Thursday.

At the Sigma theatre a clever canine, Ace, the Wonder Dog, points the way to justice for gandom in "The Rookie Cop" starring Tim Holt, Janet Shaw and Virginia Weidler.

Victor MacLagien, in the role of an ex-champion boxer and father of a worthless son, is starred in "The Ex-Champ" in which leading roles are played by Tom Brown, Nan Grey, and Donald Briggs.

"The Old Maid," now at the Ohio theatre, featuring Bette Davis, Miriam Hopkins and Jane Bryan, is a picture which has many heart throbbing moments.

Miss Davis, who is as good or better than she was in "Dark Victory" is first seen as a lovely girl who falls in love with a northern soldier, played by George Brent, who is killed in action. The next 20-years of her life are filled with hardships.

The memorable tale of one of the most courageous assignments ever carried out by a newspaper man is told in "Stanley and Livingstone" at the Quilna theatre.

Spencer Tracy has the title role as Henry H. Stanley, while Sir Cedric Hardwicke is cast as Dr. Livingstone.

OHIO Thoroughly annoyed by persistently printed rumors that they were not speaking, that they fought openly on the set and that their director, Edmund Goulding, had to use every ounce of his diplomatic suavity to keep them from each other's throat while they played their scenes as two women, both in love with the same man, and hating each other, in "The Old Maid," which has been held over until Saturday at the Ohio theatre. Bette Davis and Miriam Hopkins hit upon the perfect way to correct the errors and bring out the truth.

Getting a pair of boxing gloves from the property man, they fought a brisk one-minute round of boxing while the "still" cameraman on the set, Bert Sir, snapped a series of action shots which they sent to every gossip columnist who had intimated that they were "in love." Goulding referred the police propaganda, and appeared in all the shots.

QUILNA Sir Cedric Hardwicke, the distinguished British actor, sacrificed a small fortune to play the role of Dr. Livingstone in Darryl F. Zanuck's production of "Stanley and Livingstone," at the Quilna theatre, with Spencer Tracy, Nancy Kelly and Richard Greene in stellar roles.

For Sir Cedric has wanted to portray the famous explorer-navigator even since he was a boy.

One of the most elusive of all actors where films are concerned, he has turned down scores of parts because they did not appeal to him. But in order to play the hero of his boyhood days at Bridgnorth School in England, the actor closed the tour of his play, "Shadow and Substance," four months before schedule.

It was Zanuck who persuaded Sir Cedric to come to Hollywood five years ago to play the bishop in "The Miserables," and he returned two years later to appear in "The Green Light."

Spencer Tracy shares the title role as Henry H. Stanley, the great newspaper man who found Livingstone in the black heart of Africa. Others prominently featured in the cast are Walter Brennan, Charles Coburn, Henry Hull and Henry Travers.
