

Chickenpox and mumps kept Wisconsin doctors busier than usual in January, according to case reports sent to the state board of health. There were 3,879 cases of chickenpox, or 1,500 more than the 7-

year mean for January, while measles reached 1,129 cases to be twice as prevalent as usual for the mid-winter month. Other "catching" diseases show ing case totals higher than the year mean were septic sore throa 38 cases, up 20 cases; tularemi

five cases, up four; undulant feve five cases, up two; poliomyeliti three cases, up two; tuberculosi 142 cases, up 15, and syphilis, 5 cases, up 15 cases from the 7-yea January mean. The latter two di eases, the board cited, are subje to current intensive case-finding programs and the rise in newly reported cases probably does not

mean increased prevalence in Wisconsin. Marked reduction in January


