"Gang Busters" To Recount Break-Up Of Lepke Empire

True Story Of Pioneer Child Lost On Overland Trail And Discovered Later To Be Told By Old Ranger

The decline and fall of the Lepke empire, which had a "take" of millions of dollars every year from the hundreds of thousands of innocent people it preyed upon, will be told in the second and concluding dramatization of the story of Louis (Lepke) Buchalter on Gang Busters, Saturday at 8 p. m. over WABC.

The concluding installment of the case will trace the efforts of the government to convict Lepke and his lieutenants of "price fixing" in various racketeering which violated the Sherman anti-trust law. During this investigation Lepke disappeared, causing the breakup of his "invisible empire" and, leading to gang wars and killings. This necessitated a vast, nationwide dragnet which finally forced Lepke to surrender to the authorities thru the office of Walter Winchell, who acted as intermediary.

The Old Ranger will tell the true story of Billie Derick, pioneer child lost on the Overland Trail and accidentally discovered by a nephew 59 years later, on the "Death Valley Days" broadcast, Saturday at 9:30 p. m. over WFAP.

The career of one of America's outstanding living painters, Waldo Peiree, will be dramatized on Art for Your Sake, Saturday at 7:00 p. m. over WABC. After wandering all over the earth, Peiree returned to his native Maine to paint his family, his friends, his neighbors, and the folks he knew so well. It has been said that thru his canvases, Peiree's family has become one of the best known in America.

"Breakfast in the Barn" is typical of Peiree's interest in the daily living of Maine folk, and it is in this picture that Dr. Bernard Myers of the National Art society will comment during the program.

The inside story of how a little group of willful men" sabotaged a great American airplane factory, causing the death of two pilots, will be told by Col. Roosevelt Turner, speed ace on Sky Hunters Saturday at 7:30 p. m. WABC.

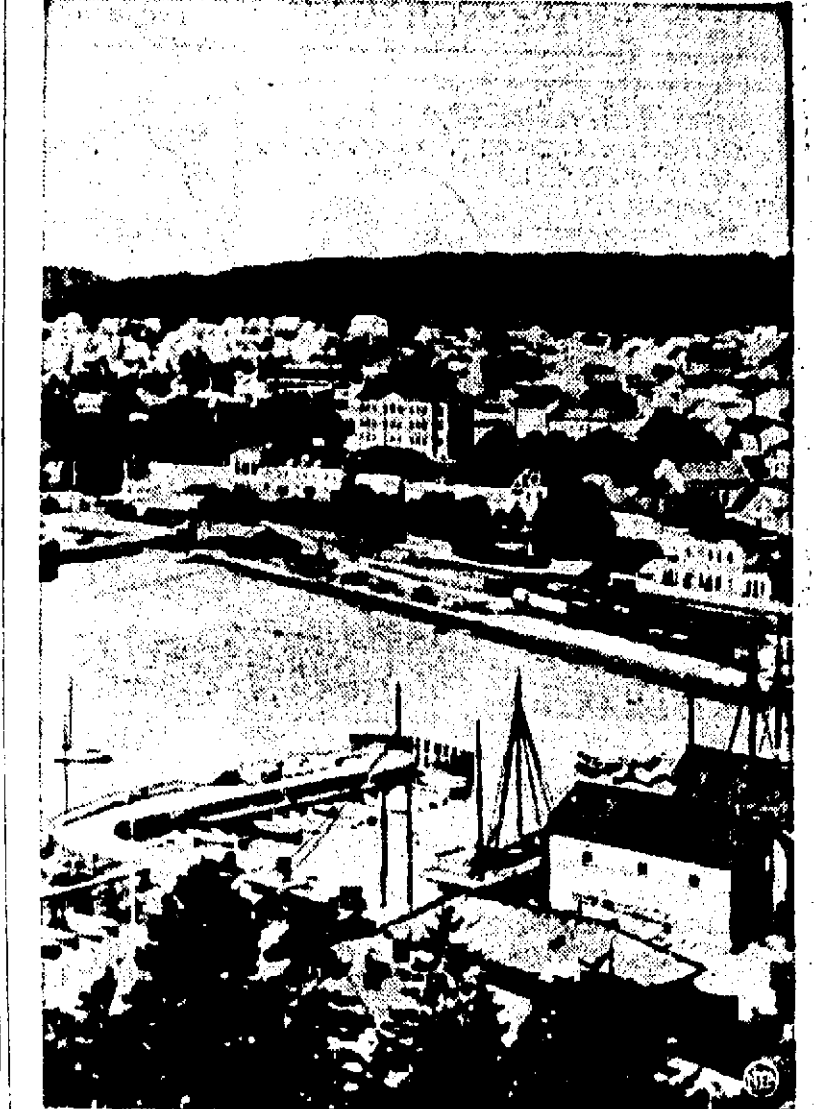
U. S. ACTS TO PROTECT SHIPS
