Census Men 'Raid' City's 'Jungles' Madison have finished counting the man who makes his home where he hangs his hat.

Census takers, under the super-vision of E. L. Lenahan, Dane county census director, swooped down on the city's four hobo "jungles," its hotels, transient homes, tourist homes and camps. and trailer camps, looking for the elusive transient.

Madison and the rest of the nation worked in unison, for the census bureau in Washingion told its enumerators to make the count on the same day, April 8, to prevent duplication insofar as it was possi-

The Madison "zero hour" for the transient count was set at 8 p. m., Lenahan said.

The Madison office borrowed a policeman and a police squad car in case a little persuasion might be needed in the "jungles," and began to make the rounds of the four "jungles." Lenahan said. The night was cold and rain had fallen about two hours before the 'zero hour.'

When the dripping "jungles" were penetrated, the occupants already had boarded trains or

found shelter in other places. "We got only one hobo that night," Lenahan reported, "and our men had to look for three hours to find him."

Census blanks were left for each hotel, trailer and tourist camp and transient home, to be filled out with data concerning the occupants. Directions were given to mail the forms to the Madison office, when the information had been supplied.

"If residents there had permanent addresses elsewhere, we forgot about them," Lenahan said, "but we added to Madison's pop-ulation figure any traveler who goes from place to place without a permanent address, and all persons who worked and lived at the places.

"One Madison hotel had 279 guests." he continued, "and we only found one Madison citizen in the whole group."

Returns from trailer and tourist camps were light, Lenshan pointed out, because the season was not far enough advanced. Every accredited tourist home and trailer "court" large enough to be identified were hombarded with blanks however. Transient homes whose occupants had no other place to go, added to the city's figure.

Madison's most concentrated transient population. and by far the largest, was not affected greatly by the count, Lemahan said, referring to the University of Wisconsin. Students whose parents live in other cities will be counted by census takers in their home towns, Lenahan pointed out, but those who have permanent positions here while going to school, now number among

Madison's citizens. The city and county jails were not part of the big drive the night of April 8. Census takers will take them in order, as they come on their lists, he said.

Any transient who is receiving lodging at his own request, and any inmate receiving lodging by police request will be counted as Madison's own, if they're unable to give some other permanent address when the census taker

comes around, Lenahan said. Neither were Mendota hospital, the veterans' hospital, and Camp Madison, the Civilian Conservation Corps unit, counted the night of April 8. The census bureau appointed staff members at the hospital as enumerators, and in the CCC camp the captain and lieutenant in charge counted the boys.

0 0 0 No question about it, censustaking is a thorough business. Lenahan asserted. There's about only one way in which a person can get out of the census-other

than dying. "Our object on April 8 was to get the man who's home is where he hangs his hat." Lenahan explained, "and the only ones who got away from us then were the transients who boarded trains or when the deadline arrived. We couldn't catch those fellows."
