NBC Ready for Political Conventions

Plans for covering the Republican and Democratic national conventions have been completed by the National Broadcasting Co.

A. A. Schneier, NBC director of news and special events, and George McElrath, NBC operations engineer, have been working for several weeks with the radio committees of both national committees and today announced all was ready for the coverage.

The Republicans will open in Philadelphia June 24 in the Municipal auditorium, and the Democrats will gather at Chicago, in the Chicago stadium, on July 15. Both conventions are expected to last from five days to a week.

Every phase of both conventions from the pre-convention gatherings to the balloting by states for presidential and vice presidential nominees will be covered.

On the NBC-Red network, H. V. Kaltenborn and Earl Godwin will follow the progress of the conventions. On the NBC-Blue network will be heard Baukhe, Raymond Clapper, Washington columnist of The Wisconsin State Journal and Lowell Thomas.

For the actual balloting, NBC will install microphones throughout the halls. Thus delegates from each state and territory will announce their vote so that both national committees and the radio audience will be able to hear each vote as cast.

In addition to the commentator and announcing staffs, NBC also will have present at both conventions a news staff to work with the national committees and with other commentators heard regularly on commercial programs.

Cadet Board to Examine Air Pupils

The Madison office of the United States army organized reserves today received notice that a traveling flying cadet board will meet at 312 E. Wisconsin ave., Milwaukee, headquarters of the Wisconsin military area, to examine candidates for training and pass upon college credentials of applicants.

Applicants will be accepted for training starting May 15, but groups for June to August are completed, the notification said.

Candidates must present evidence of satisfactory completion of two years' collegiate work, and those accepted will be sent to one of a dozen civilian air schools for the first 12 weeks' training. Those closest to Wisconsin are the Chicago School of Aeronautics, Glenview, Ill., and the Rarks Air college, East St. Louis, Ill. Three months at Randolph field and three more at Kelly field will follow for those satisfactorily completing the first period.

Candidates are paid \$75 a month while in training and are furnished food, uniform and quarters.

10,000 Attend Extension Courses

Extension classes in 46 Wisconsin cities recorded nearly 10,000 student registrations in college credit courses and business and technical subjects offered by the University of Wisconsin extension division in the 1939-40 school year.

The final enrollment figure was shown in statistics for both semesters compiled by the office of field organization, of which Chester Allen is director.

The number of extension classes in both semesters was last year, reached 333, two more than last year. Registrations, including those of young people enrolled in citizenship training classes, totaled 9,821.

In 23 cities the classes were subsidized by boards of vocational and adult education. Fourteen class projects were sponsored by county boards, five by state teacher colleges, one each by a real estate board, a mercantile house, and a woman's club. Degree credit was offered in 288 classes.

During both semesters 19 cities shared in the local and state-sponsored program of college classes offering credit toward university or college degree requirements.

Citizenship training groups for new voters, open to all 21-year-old youths in the county, were conducted with university extension cooperation in 14 cities. The number enrolled was approximately 2,800.

Courses in ground training and flight principles, taught by the Civil Aeronautics Authority, were organized by the extension division in five college centers, Madison, Milwaukee, Oshkosh, Stevens Point, and Whitewater. Total students enrolled was about 90.

LYLE, Wash.—(U.P.)—Primitive Indians that roamed the hills and plains of Central Washington hundreds of years ago were sun-worshippers, it has been learned from a study of writings and paintings on rocks found in this region.

Painting in colors of red, green, black, blue, and yellow with a pigment that has endured for centuries, a guide to their day that no one has yet been able to decipher.

Students of Indian lore say the designs of rays and circles indicate the tribes worshipped the sun, but have not been able to discover the exact meaning of the markings.

Modern Indians, it is said, do not understand them and it is believed the early dwellers were a race apart.

Recently, skeletons of what were thought to be members of the primitive tribes were uncovered. They were of adults slightly more than four feet in height.
