## Diphtheria Deaths Fall to Vigilance

Comparative state death rates for 1938 show Wisconsin tied for third place in low diphtheria death rate, with only New York and Rhode Island surpassing us. To gain third place, Wisconsin limited her diphtheria deaths two years ago to 17, but last year only four diphtheria deaths were recorded for Wisconsin's 3,000,000 persons.

In many ways our state health conditions are lucky. That is to say, our climate is invigorating, our population is nicely divided into urban and rural groups, our land is largely productive, and our native scene has attracted and held what sociologists have often referred to as an unusually high type of people. All these things make for a healthy population.

But this neat approach to the complete conquest of diphtheria was not lucky—rather it is the reward of well-planned, continuing programs of immunization carried on faithfully in communities throughout the state.

Some populations have been known to relax their vigilance when protection against such a menace has so nearly reached perfection, but that has never happened in Wisconsin.

Our public health forces, including civic groups who never fail to act for health advancement, are pledged to stay with diphtheria immunization until every child in the state has this protection, and to see that each year's new army of 50,000 babies likewise receives it.

In 1931, Wisconsin staggered under the shock of 2,202 deaths from diphtheria alone, and we have not forgotten what this disease can do.






