THERE IS one situation in which the important thing to know is whether your partner has three cards of a particular suit. If he tells you by his play that he does not hold exactly three, you can then nearly always tell what number he does hold, so that you can govern your own play cor-rectly. That is when the declarer embarks upon play of the dum-my's suit, in which you hold the ace, the dummy being void of any re-entries. By telling you the length of his own holding, your partner can guide you to the correct time for play of your ace.




