ROAD PROJECT GIVEN APPROVAL BY 2 COUNTIES

KENTON, March 21—Approval of the Hardin-Wyandot road improvement project, which will take up a large part of the 227 men now certified to WPA but not employed, was given commissioners of the two counties following a meeting held here.

The action followed recommendation of J. H. Kelly, district WPA manager, who was here last week urging that work be provided for the large number of unemployed but certified WPA laborers. About 7 miles of the Latham-Flowers rd. which is known, will be improved under the set-up.

Under the program worked out, Wyandot-co commissioners will provide about \$5,000 of the total cost of approximately \$12,000. It was explained, all WPA labor will be drawn from Hardin-co. Estimates of \$26,633 for labor and \$3,850 for material and equipment already have been approved by WPA officials on the construction of two miles of the road. It will be graded, widened and surface-treated.

The project will be extended to some \$125,000 for the seven miles as soon as WPA officials give final approval on the entire improvement.
