There is Always a First Time

NEW YORK — (U.P.) — Here's something that those bookmakers who're laying 3-1 and 4-1 on the Texas Longhorns against Southern Methodist don't know—a team coached by Dana X. Bible has never beaten a team coached by Marty Bell.

During Bible's four years at Texas, the Longhorns have lost four straight times to Bell's S. M. U. team. Before that, when Bible coached at Texas A. & M. and Bell directed the gridiron destinies of Texas Christian, he was never able to get better than a tie with any of Bell's T. C. U. outfits. Bell either knows how to stop Bible's offense or has the Indian sign on the bald-pated Texas mentor. The Mustangs beat practically the same Texas team they'll face today by a 21-13 score last year. Bell has been particularly successful the past two years in stopping Jack Crain, the Longhorns' star back.

What Bible fears even more than the Marty Bell jinx is that before the season's over the Longhorns will catch rain and mud. The thundering herd of Texas is essentially a speed outfit and will have to operate at a distinct disadvantage if it has to perform against a strong club on a slow field.

Pete Layden, Texas' star triple-threat fullback, is likely to jump to the baseball major leagues when his college career is over. He is a hardhitting outfielder and has attracted the attention of several major league scouts.

Ends, Yurcheschen, Case, and Kuzyanski, Penn; tackles, Yacoubic, Buffalo, and Mosholsky, Oregon; guards, Andeopoulos, Worcester Tech, and Zecherich, Northeastern; center, Sabastanski, Fordham; quarter, Ceithaml, Michigan; half's, Szykowski, Lehigh, and Lutzyshowsky, Army; full, Przybylowski, Clarkson.

Three 'Big' Games Draw 200,000

(By United Press)

At New York, Philadelphia, and Minneapolis today a total of 200,000 football fans watch the three "big" games of the day—Army vs. Notre Dame, Pennsylvania vs. Navy, and Minnesota vs. Northwestern.

Added to the usual pageantry of the Army-Notre Dame classic is the fact that both teams are undefeated and untied. Notre Dame is a slight favorite although Army's smooth-clicking eleven stacks up as the toughest team the Irish have met to date. A crowd of 76,000 bought out Yankee Stadium for the game.

Penn and Navy also are unbeaten but the Middies had a scoreless tie with Harvard last week. Rains, considered favorable to the Seagulls, brought the odds close to even. A sellout crowd of 70,000 is due to see the game at Franklin Field, Philadelphia.

In Minneapolis, Minnesota's juggernaut meets a Northwestern team that may be the last major obstacle in the Gophers' drive for an unbeaten season. Injuries suffered against Michigan last week made the Gophers only a slight favorite. More than 50,000 are expected.
