# No Sabotage Found in Railroad Wreck

INDIANAPOLIS -(U.P.)-Authorities said Saturday that there was no evidence of sabotage in the wreck of a five-coach army troop train Friday near York-town, Ind., and indicated an FBI investigation would not be made.

The train was going from Camp Perry, O., to Jefferson Barracks Mo., when it crashed into a freight train. Fourteen army privates suffered minor injuries.

Railway officials blamed the wreck on a mix-up of signals.

# Life Could Last 10 Years Longer

CLEVELAND-(U.P)-The average span of life for American man and women could be in-creased as much as 10 years "if we only apply what we know," in the opinion of Dr. Victor Heiser, internationally known public health authority and writer.

Dr. Heiser, consultant to the National Association of Manufacturer's committee on healthful working conditions, said that "all the Nobel prize-winning research in the world is of no use to the people until the knowledge is applied in the field."

People, he said, learn by seeing and doing, and for that reason practical exhibits go a long way toward orienting the public to the advances and advantages of modern public health programs. Health Defense Necessity

Relating his subject to war needs, Dr. Heiser pointed out that in 1940 each of America's 17 million industrial workers lost an average of nine and a half days a year from their jobs, mostly because of illness—a total of 160,000,000 man-days lost to industrial production.

"This is bad enough in ordinary mes," he said, "but in times of national emergency like today's it becomes part of the emergency itself. We must defend ourselves, our workers and our fighters against illness if we are to sur-"America must toughen up. We

must climb down from the soft ap of luxury and get tough about it. This is war! Tending flowers behind the Maginot lines of overconfidence and apathy will only lead to self-betrayal."

Program Is Beneficial

The national Association of Manufacturers, Dr. Heiser said, has recently completed a health survey among its 8,000 members

as a means toward increasing de

fense production by reducing the

number of man-days lost.
"The survey indicated the importance which industrial health services can have during the war period. Absenteeism was reduced 30 per cent; the occurrence of occupational diseases by 63 per cent accident frequency by 45 cent; labor turnover by 27 per cent and compensation insurance premiums were reduced by 29 pe

The problem of toughening up America, he said, is primarily a problem of building up the physique and staying powers of the industrial workers, while the next logical step is bolstering the physical stamina of the entire civilian population.


