Runkel Will Direct Music at Congregational Church

Lavern Runkel, 2540 Sher-man ave., has been engaged as director of music at the First Congregational church to succeed Prof. E. B. Gordon, Mrs. Walter Price, chairman of the church's music committee, announced Saturday. Gordon retired this year after 25 years of choral leadership at the church.

Runkel moved to Madison recently after long training and experience in public school and church music. He was graduated from North Central college, Naperville, Ill., in 1933 with a major in science and a minor in music. He was soloist with the college gice club, which traveled extensively.

He was in charge of choral work at Beaver Dam and Watertown high schools, where he was science teacher. He also conducted choirs in the Beaver Dam Evangelical and Watertown Congregational churches Runkel also was instrumental in developing the Tri-City Music festivals in Beaver Dam, Watertown, and Oconomowoe.

With a graduate degree in biochemistry from the Univer-sity of Wisconsin, Runkel is employed in war-connected work at the Scanlan laboratories here. He is married and the father of a 2-year-old daughter.

Runkel will assume the church position Sept. 1, continuing his Scanlan work, also.

Permanent Scrapbook Part of Institution's Information Work

All news about Madison men in war service is being compiled in the form of a per-manent indexed scrapbook as part of the Madison Free Library war information service, announces Helen E. Farr, librarian. Newspaper notices dating from July 1 are now ready for public examination, and the work of clipping notices dating back to Dec. 7 is going on as fast as possible.

"We intend to make this a complete record," said Miss Farr, "and will bind the sheets in book form as soon as we have material for a volume of suitable thickness. The Madison newspapers have generously contributed a free subscription for this service, and supplied us with file of back issues. The huge scrap book is the gift of Francis Grimm of the Grimm book bindery. Of course, we expect the notices to be of current interest to Madison residents, but as time goes on, they will be useful to future local historians.*

Other Services

The scrap book is only part of the library war information service, which also in-cludes material on local and national wartime activities. Margaret Nordholm, librarian in charge of this work, has compiled a directory of the activities of Madison organizations, which she keeps up to date by frequent calls to Madison groups, and by careful clipping of Madison papers.

Pamphlets from government and private sources are also available to borrowers, and range over a wide field including defense jobs, ration-ing, military activities, and civilian defense. Some of the most recent books, pamphlets, and magazines are always on display near the entrance, so that library users may examine the current publications and borrow those most useful for individual needs.

The library is receiving several bulletins of current value. One of the most attractive to come out of Washington is Victory, official weekly bulle-tin of the Office of War Information. It reviews the week in price administration, war


