Women's Injuries Double in State

The number of women injured in war industry during the past 10 months has almost doubled, the state medical society reported today.

The problem will be discussed at an industrial medical clinic at Milwaukee, Nov. 17.

Of the 2,906 persons injured in January, 209 or 7.2 per cent were women, the society said. Of these, 3,415 injured in September, 352 or 11.2 per cent were women.

Army Pilot Sought for Crash Inquest

RIVERSIDE, Calif. (UP)—Coroner Ben F. White of Riverside county said today he has asked the army to produce the pilot of the army plane which collided with an American Air Lines transport near Palm Springs Friday.

White said the army pilot's testimony was necessary for Tuesday's inquest into deaths of the 12 persons, nine passengers and three crew members, who were aboard the transport. The bodies have been brought here.

The army confirmed that one of its planes collided with the transport but announced no details.

\$62,500 Damage Suit, Fire Add to Errol Flynn's Woes

HOLLYWOOD—(UP)—A \$62,500 damage suit Saturday night added to the troubles of debonair screen actor Errol Flynn, already accused of the statutory rape of a 17-year-old girl.

It seems to be an open season on Flynn, complained his attorney, Jerry Giesler. Flynn was named defendant in the damage suit brought by Eric Costa, butler of heiress Barbara Hutton, as the result of the "battle of the butlers" that followed a birthday party at Flynn's home.

THREE — Hissed and boomed on the screen in Hollywood. FOUR — Faced with increasing notorious publicity that caused film makers to recall the scandal two decades ago involving Flatty Arbuckle that ruined the plump comedian's screen career.

FIVE — Forced to battle flames in his home started by an exploding furnace. Costa's damage suit made Flynn a defendant with James Fleming, his stand-in, but did not accuse the Irish actor of actually having participated in the brawl.

Slayer Plans to Remarry

Jury Convicts Former Dice Girl

By JAYNE MILLER CHICAGO—(UP)—Mrs. Eleanor Williams, 28, who was convicted of manslaughter for killing her lover after he jilted her, said today she would remarry her former husband in a jail ceremony because "he came running back to me when he heard about my trouble."

Mrs. Williams, blonde former "dice girl," said she would discuss wedding plans with her divorced husband, Clarence Williams, when he visited her today in the county jail. He said they were divorced three years ago because she wanted to marry Gordon McNaughton, former Boston Red Sox baseball player, the man she killed.

Williams, a railroad telegrapher, offered to remarry his former wife during the trial, when he testified in her behalf. He said he would enter the army air corps as a telegrapher within a month and wanted to hold the wedding before that. Mrs. Williams said she wanted to be married Tuesday.

"It will be good to be married again," she said.

Warden Frank G. Sain of Cook county jail, where Mrs. Williams is in custody, said that he would permit the wedding, but that the couple would have to abide by Illinois marriage laws which call for a three-day wait between the issuing of the license and the ceremony.

Asst. State's Atty. Julius Sherman, who prosecuted Mrs. Williams' case, said the proposal was "a bit of fraudulent gallantry designed to influence Mrs. Williams' plea for a new trial."

Emmett A. Moynihan, defense attorney, said that he will file a motion for a new trial today and ask that she be released on bail.

A jury of four men and eight women, returned a manslaughter verdict early Sunday and recommended a sentence of from one to 14 years.

Mrs. Williams admitted shooting McNaughton in another woman's hotel room with a gun which she had stolen from a policeman. The policeman later committed suicide.
