

"Famous Jury Trials" Mark Second Birthday On Radio

George Burns To Occupy Driver's Seat During Burns And Allen Show Tuesday Night

"Famous Jury Trials", weekly program presenting fictionalized versions of courtroom trials outstanding in history, will celebrate its second birthday over WJZ with the broadcast at 9 p. m. Tuesday.

In his quest for unusual situations for the "Famous Jury Trials" series, Martin H. Young, attorney, has taken the entire history of jurisprudence for his field. Terse dialogue, swift pace and electrifying sound effects are woven into the scripts in order that the listener may experience the illusion of being in a courtroom.

A tangled tale of jealousy and deceit which culminates in the murder of wealthy Henry Steele will be unfolded during "Famous Jury Trials", at 9 p. m. over WJZ.

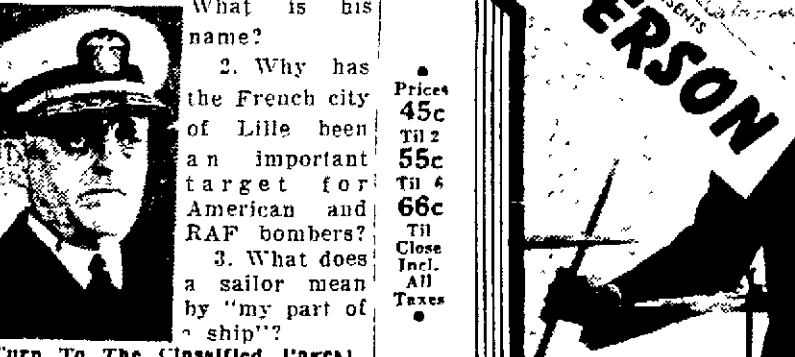

New Ellery Queen Mystery Opens At Sigma Wednesday

"The Hidden Hand" Is Co-Featured With Latest In Sleuthing Series Of The Cinema Detective

Latest in the sleuthing series of a cinema detective is "Enemy Agents Meet Ellery Queen," the film scheduled for Wednesday showing at the Sigma theatre. William Gargan, Margaret Lindsay and Charley Grapewin have the leading roles on the side of the law. Also showing is "The Hidden Hand," with Craig Stevens and Elisabeth Fraser in the leading roles. The concluding films Tuesday are "The Glass Key," starring Brian Donley, Veronica Lake and Alan Ladd, and "Bowery at Midnight," with Bela Lugosi.

The current offering of the Lyric theatre, "Diamond Jim Brady," features Edward Arnold in the title role, unfolding the story of one of the wealthiest men of the frivolous period known as the Gay Nineties. Also on the program is "Wings Over Honolulu," a gripping story of thrills in the air.

tion, Director James Hogan has compiled this latest in the Columbia crime series with such stellar players as Gale Sondergaard, Gilbert Roland, Sig Ruman and Minor Watson. Combining a happy blend of thrills and comedy, "The Hidden Hand," adventure picture, will also be offered. Cast in a story-ful of intrigue are Craig Stevens, Elisabeth Fraser and Julie Bishop. "The Hidden Hand" tells the tale of an eccentric spinster who uses her insane brother to terrorize her family, only to get more horror than she bargained for.

OHIO When Gene Krupa's band makes a personal appearance at a theatre or on a one-nighter, they invariably leave the audience limp— but crying for more. Krupa, who is due at the Ohio theatre for an appearance on Thursday thru arrangements with Music Corp. of America, is both a capable maestro and a talented and entertaining showman.

Most lenders have been condemned for their lack of personality and stage presence, but Gene is superlative on the stage. Curiously enough the drum major makes no particular effort to be a showman, the result achieved being natural. The drums are the most showmanly of all musical instruments and the way in which Gene handles his drums makes it possible for him to get the most out of the best instrument.

No tricks are used by Krupa, but the way in which he plays is a show in itself. Krupa doesn't believe that trick hats, curious uniforms and other stage props have a place in the popular dance band of the day. He has never used a producer for his single shows and one-nighters, but the reception accorded his appearances has won him the admiration of many a puzzled performer.

Max Gordon, who produced the original stage show, also producing "My Sister Eileen." Supporting players include George Tobias, Allyn Joslyn, Miss Jeff Donnell, Richard Quine, June Havoc, Donald MacBride, Gordon Jones and Frank Sully.
