

Parade Of Stars Appears In "Tales Of Manhattan"

Much Discussed Movie Slated To Open With Preview At Quilna Theatre Wednesday Night

The much discussed film, "Tales of Manhattan," which follows a coat around on some of the highest-paid shoulders in Hollywood, will be offered in preview showing at the Quilna theatre Wednesday. The roll-call includes Charles Boyer, Henry Fonda, Paul Robeson, Rita Hayworth, Charles Laughton, Ethel Waters, Ginger Rogers, Edward G. Robinson and Rochester. Showing for the last time Wednesday are "Berlin Correspondent," and "Careful, Soft Shoulders."

Richard Greene, English actor who has been absent from the screen several months while on duty with the British Army returns temporarily in "Flying Fortress," the film scheduled to commence at the Sigma theatre Wednesday. The scamping masters of turmoil, the East Side Kids, "appear in the co-feature, "Neath Brooklyn Bridge." Showing for the last time Monday are "The Mummy's Tomb" and "Night Monster."

Bette Davis and Paul Henreid are the stars of the current Ohio feature, "Now, Voyager," the story of a New England girl who is squelched by a tyrannical mother, but who develops a new personality thru love and proceeds to literally kick the old lady's teeth out. Appearing in the supporting cast are Claude Rains, Bonita Granville, Ilka Chase, Gladys Cooper, John Lodge, Lee Patrick and Franklin Pangborn.

What's left after the I-A's and I-B's have been taken composes the cowboy gangs who ride and shoot and otherwise appear tougher than nails in the current Lyric film, "Sunset Serenade," with Roy Rogers and his gun-deal justice prevailing in the end. Helen Parrish and Joan Woodbury, formerly of some of Hollywood's high-budget films, brighten up the film with their occasional appearances. Also showing is "Treat 'Em Rough."

The Japs lose face and plenty of teeth when they tangle with Humphrey Bogart in his latest thriller, "Across the Pacific." Jap-blasting jamboree now at the State theatre. Mary Astor lends feminine charm to the cast while Sydney Greenstreet provides the menace. Also on the screen is "The Affairs of Martha," starring Marsha Hunt and Richard Carlson.

Three years ago those two indefatigable gentlemen, Boris Morros and S. P. Eagle, conceived the idea for a screenplay that would cut the very heart out of old New York and lay it before America's moviegoers to behold in all of its reckless adventure, hilarious humor, and palpitating romance—indeed, in all of the fabulous facets of its dramatic existence.

The result, "Tales of Manhattan" it's called, debuts locally at the Quilna theatre, Wednesday evening, just as its producers originally conceived it. The film has been hailed by no less an authority than Walter Winchell as "one of the greatest films I've ever seen." And it has been acclaimed with equal enthusiasm wherever it has played. And no wonder! Imagine all of these stars in one picture: Charles Boyer, Rita Hayworth, Ginger Rogers, Henry Fonda, Charles Laughton, Edward G. Robinson, Paul Robeson, Ethel Waters and "Rochester." But don't go yet, brother!
