THE SHOES-Women learned a long time ago that it is futile to attempt to bowl in high heels. They know that bowling shoes make bowling easier, just as baseball, football, track or basketball

shoes make for better accomplishment in those sports.

In selecting a pair of bowling shoes, whether she buys them or rents them, the woman bowler should know there are "righthanded" shoes and "left-handed" shoes. In other words, if she bowls with her left hand the woman should ask for a "lefthanded" pair of shoes, or vice versa.

The right-handed shoes, for example, find the left shoe sole made of a composition that will slide on the approach, while the right shoe sole is made to grip the approach, providing traction.

Here's the way it works: The woman bowler takes her next to the last step on her right foot. As she moves forward to take the last step on her left foot, the right foot grips the approach, as her momentum and the weight of the ball propel her forward. This prevents slipping on the right foot.

On the other hand—or foot if you will—the woman bowler wants to slide on her left foot. That is, she takes the last step on her left foot, sliding up to the foul line as she releases the ball. Now, for example, if a left-handed bowler used a right-handed" pair of shoes she would slip when she wanted traction and her foot would grip the floor when she wanted to slide.
