OCS Lists Minimum Needs of Civilians During Wartime

High for Morale

WASHINGTON — (U.P.) — A tentative study of bedrock economy gives generous recognition of the importance of professional baseball, football and hockey to wartime morale, it was revealed today. But horse and dog racing and college football are considered relatively unimportant civilian morale by the report.

The report was compiled by the office of civilian supply of the war production board at the request of economic stabilization Director James F. Byrnes.

Now in the process of revision the report was intended to present the OCS's ideas of the minimum needs of the civilian population below which cuts should not be made. It does not represent any settled policy of the government Baseball Approved

The report was presented in terms of paid admission to sports given by OCS to professional base-ball with the notation that admission to this popular sport should not be allowed to fall below 70 per cent of the 1941 gate which totaled \$20,900,000. Bedrock admissions were fixed at \$14,700,000.

Admissions to professional football and hockey games could be halved, the report said. Professional football fans paid \$3,300,000 in 1941 and hockey fans \$3,600,000.
