

It's an old pitcher's prescription — control your throws for more strikes and fewer, balls and the war-time shortage of manpower enhances its import-

ance. Mathewson Was Good O'Neill and Zeller put their heads together and decided that if they were to get along with an smallest mound corps in years, the "jack-rabbit ball" promised there would have to be a miniby A.
