

Shaw's "Pygmalion" To Be Featured Sunday Night

A broadcast of a Bernard Shaw play, a rarity for radio, will be heard when Gertrude Lawrence presents "Pygmalion" with Brian Aherne, on the "Revlon Revue" over WEAF Sunday at 9 p. m. EST. "Pygmalion" affords Miss Lawrence an opportunity to display her versatility as an English dialectician, since the play concerns the transformation of a cockney scullery maid to a lady of the upper classes. Aherne, as Professor Higgins, bets that he can pick any girl of the slums and, after a few months, have her accepted in the best society. The course of instruction and the final success of the venture forms the plot of "Pygmalion," one of Shaw's satires.

"When the cat's away, the mice will play" fits the situation to a T, when Nora returns from a week-end visit to hear rumors of Nick's escape with an Arabian dancer, in "The Case of the Mispliced Beard," this Sunday's episode of "The Adventures of the Thin Man." (WABC 9:30 p. m. EST).

EARLY HISTORY OF HOTELS TOLD BY BURKHARDT

Growing from a modest beginning in 1831, Lima's hotel accommodations and accouterments for entertainment compare well today with those of cities of more than double its population, according to Frank A. Burkhardt who addressed the Allen-co Historical and Archeological society in Memorial hall Friday evening.

The first tavern with lodging accommodations was erected on the southeast corner of what now is the public square. It was built by John Porter Mitchell, was two stories and housed eight rooms in all.

The speaker grouped Lima's hotel activities into three distinctive periods.

The first era was the pioneer tavern time "that held sway from 1831 to the time of the coming of the first railroad in the 1850's." The second era included the railroad times up to when oil was discovered in Lima in 1885. Third came the period given impetus by the opening of the Faurer Opera House during which the oil industry developed into a booming factor in the progress of Lima.

"Our hats are off," Burkhardt asserted, "to our most efficient and far-seeing proprietors who now operate hotels in Lima with doors ajar to an ever appreciative coterie of patrons."
