STIMSON FAILS TO SHOW NEED OF LABOR DRAFT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21—(UP)—Members of the senate military affairs committee said generally today that Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson had failed to show conclusive need for the national service legislation requested by President Roosevelt to curb wartime strikes.

Stimson, endorsing the pending Austin-Wadsworth bill to conscript men and women for non-combat service, told the committee yesterday that members of the armed forces demanded such legislation, that the public wanted it and that the big job now was to impress congress of its need.

Most committee members who heard Stimson agreed that many servicemen and a large number of civilians were resentful over wartime strikes and threats of strikes. But they disagreed that labor conscription was the answer.

REJECTION OF FEDERAL BALLOT PROPOSAL SEEN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 21—(INS)—Congressional polls indicated today that the house will reject a federal ballot for servicemen by approximately a 100-vote margin, and will overwhelmingly pass a senate-approved bill leaving the problem to the states.

With a vote on the issue scheduled for next week, two polls have been conducted. One has been made by Republicans, the other by Democrats who favor the senate version.

The GOP poll shows that of the 209 Republicans in the house, approximately 190 of them favor the senate bill and are opposed to a federal ballot. The Democratic poll gives the senate measure 89 out of the 217 Democratic votes in the lower branch.

This would divide the house approximately 279 to 147 against a federal ballot, with the votes of four members belonging to minority parties, not included.

CASUALTIES IN ITALIAN DRIVE TOTAL 19,210

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 21—American casualties in Italy from the original landing there in September total 19,210 to date, Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson said today. These included 2,985 killed, 12,504 wounded and 3,721 missing.

Stimson pointed out particularly the casualties of the 100th Infantry Battalion, composed of Americans of Japanese ancestry, largely from Hawaii. They performed very creditably in heavy action in Italy, he said, and their losses to date have been 96 killed, 221 wounded and 17 missing.

Stimson also referred to the casualty situation in the South Pacific. In the Cape Gloucester area in New Britain 3,100 dead Japanese have been counted while American losses there included 228 killed and 694 wounded, he said.

CLEVELAND, Jan. 21—(INS)—William S. (Bill) Jack, who called on his plant employes to aid him financially in his fight against renegotiation, today announced that \$17,000,000 has been pledged as immediately available by the workers.

Jack, protesting the refund of \$7,000,000 to the government, asked his 7,500 "associates" to subscribe \$10,000,000 to insure post-war operation of Jack & Heintz, Inc. He reported today that \$17,000,000 already has been proffered for use as soon as necessary legal steps are taken. In addition, he said that \$30,000,000 will be available to him by December, 1944.
