Heaviest Barrage Planned at McCoy
 CAMP MCCOY—The countryside around Camp McCoy will reverberate to the heaviest artillery barrage in its history starting this week when the 364th field artillery division of the 76th infantry division begins a series of night problems in firing the 155 mm. howitzer m-1s recently received here.
 New enthusiasm fired the 364th enlisted men and officers when they went through "dry runs" with the new weapons—rated among the finest artillery equipment at the command of U. S. armed forces.
 Formerly the battalion—the division's "heavy" unit—had been firing the 1918 type 155—fine weapons, according to Lieut. Col. P. L. Rogers, battalion commander, but not in a class with the recently arrived artillery.

Uncle Ray's Corner
 Scorpion Stings Any Victim Which Shows Flight
 People often speak of spiders as insects, but scientists do not class them as members of the insect tribe. Along with scorpions, they are known as "arachnids," a Greek name which means "spiders." In a Greek story a woman named Arachne dared to test her skill in spinning against the goddess Athena. The story goes on to say that she was punished by being turned into a spider.
 Scorpions do not make webs, but they are cousins of spiders. Some of them grow to a greater length than any spider.
 Most scorpions live in the Torrid Zone. Some are found on plains or deserts in the Temperate Zones, but they are more common in the tropics.
 During the day, scorpions usually spend their time resting or hiding. They go under logs lying on the ground, or under stones. If they do not find such shelter, they may dig a hole in sand and get inside.
 After sunset, scorpions come out of their secret places and roam about, looking for food. They eat centipedes and spiders as well as beetles and other insects.
 Some scorpions are less than half an inch long. Others have a length of from six to eight inches. A scorpion has eight legs, the same as a spider. In addition, it has a pair of claws which grow from the head. The claws are used to catch hold of prey and pull it to the mouth.
 In most cases the scorpion takes care of the victim without stinging it. Sometimes, however, the scorpion bends its long, narrow abdomen upward and forward and stings an insect or spider which puts up a fight. That ends the battle in a hurry, since the scorpion shoots poison into the "enemy." It eats slowly, and has been known to spend an hour eating a single beetle.
 The sting of a scorpion is at the

 end of the abdomen. It has been used against people, and the poison in it causes a painful wound. Scorpions are cannibals. When they get together, they "eat each other up."

Sun Prairie
Tops Bond Quota
SUN PRAIRIE—Sun Prairie has exceeded its war bond quota, it was announced by A. A. Weiland of the Bank of Sun Prairie. The sales total \$80,905, he said, while the quota was \$80,763.
