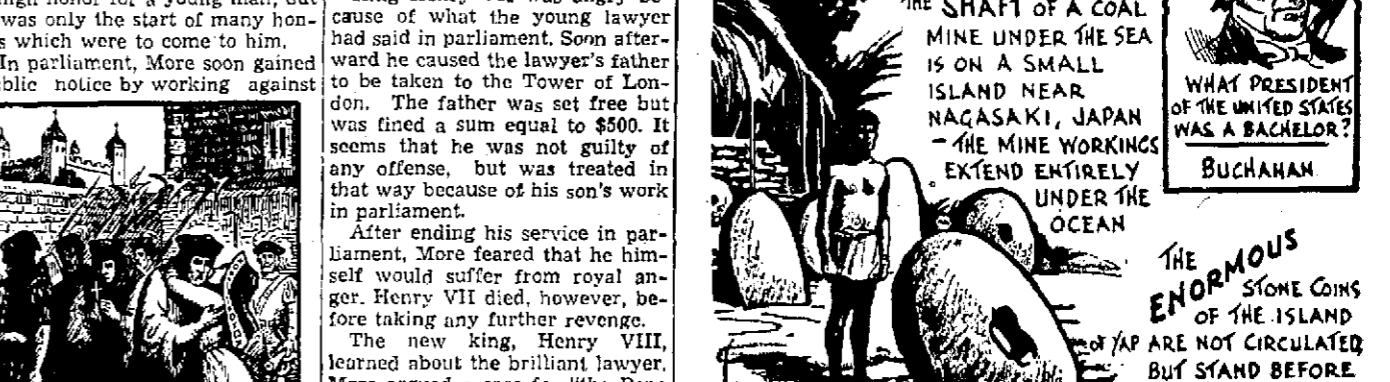
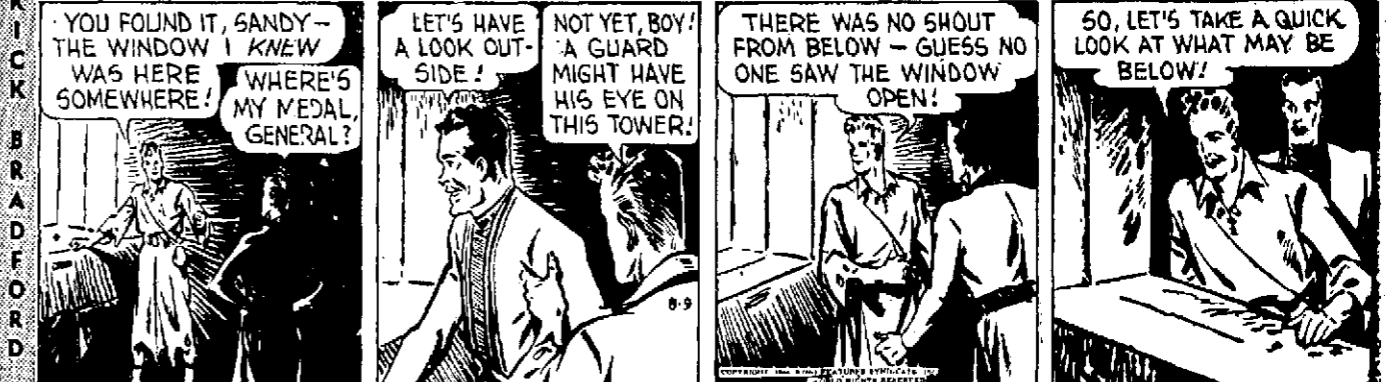

McCance Enlisted Despite Delays

SOMEWHERE IN THE SOUTH PACIFIC (Delayed) — Marine Pfc. Donald D. McCance, Route 4, Madison, Wis., a veteran of the Cape Gloucester campaign, smilingly tells of his initial dealings with the United States marine corps.
"The first time I tried to enlist," related the private first class, "they sent me home because I was too young. I needed my parents' consent."
He returned home for the required signatures, only to find that he was too late. His parents had just left on a vacation. All he could do was wait.
This he did, and on Aug. 31, 1942, a few months after his 17th birthday, he headed for the recruiting station again.
"Reports from the marines' battle for Guadalcanal were fresh in my mind," said McCance. "I was more anxious than ever. This time I was accepted."
He discontinued his schooling at East side high school, Madison, so he could enlist, and intends finishing school through the facilities offered by the corps.
Like his older brother, Platoon Sgt. William J. McCance, who served with a marine unit on Tarawa, Donald is attached to an anti-aircraft unit.
The 18-year-old marine landed with the first marine assault troops under a heavy enemy strafing and bombing attack at Cape Gloucester, New Britain a few months ago.



Uncle Ray's Corner
Thomas More Died When King's Favor Changed to Anger
When Thomas More was 26 years old, he was chosen a member of the British parliament. This was a high honor for a young man, but it was only the start of many honors which were to come to him.
In parliament, More soon gained public notice by working against public funds when she was married. More's talk on the subject caused parliament to cut down the amount, though a generous sum was voted for the princess.
King Henry VII was angry because of what the young lawyer had said in parliament. Soon afterward he caused the lawyer's father to be taken to the Tower of London. The father was set free but was fined a sum equal to \$500. It seems that he was not guilty of any offense, but was treated in that way because of his son's work in parliament.
After ending his service in parliament, More feared that he himself would suffer from royal anger. Henry VII died, however, before taking any further revenge.
The new king, Henry VIII, learned about the brilliant lawyer. More argued a case for "the Pope against the Crown," and won it. Instead of growing angry, the monarch said, "I must have this lawyer on my side in the future!"
So it came about that More went into public service. In 1521 he was made a knight, and people spoke of him as "Sir Thomas." Two years later he was chosen Speaker of parliament.
Henry VIII thought so much of More that he made frequent visits to his home. He would walk and talk with him for hours.
More was given a position as a high judge, and in this place won honor for himself. Whether a man was rich or poor, he treated him in the same fair way.
Persons who rise fast with royal favor may fall even faster when they lose it. More lost the regard of Henry VIII because he did not like the king's action in getting his first divorce. Also he opposed

Henry's deed in making himself head of the Church of England. Soon More felt the anger of this king. A charge of "treason" was made against him. After a quick trial he was put to death. Thus, at the age of 57, was ended the life of the man who wrote "Utopia." (For BIOGRAPHY section of your scrapbook.)
