BERLIN STARTED OUT AS SMALL VILLAGE ON SPREE RIVER

Years ago, during a visit in a great clerk, a Rhineland city. On the envelope was the name and street number of the person to whom the letter had been written, and also "Berlin, Germany."

The postal clerk looked at what I had written and chuckled as he said, "Yes, Berlin is in Germany all right!"

That was a little joke on me, but I might have pointed out to him that there were (and still are) 19 Berlins in the world before.

Ten men from Madison and the largest of these is Berlin, New Hampshire, which has a population of a little more than 10,000.

Yet Germany's Berlin has a far greater population than all other Berlins put together. At the time of the last census, it was the home of 4,332,000 people.

A slow-moving river flows through the heart of Berlin, and this fact may have had something to do with the name. It is probable that Berlin grew out of "Wehr" (perhaps later "Wehr-lin") meaning "dam in a river."

That point is not certain, but it is known that a little village started to grow on the southern side of the river about the year 1200. This village came to be called Berlin, whatever its name was in the first place.

The river which cuts present-day Berlin in half is known as the Spree. It is about 200 feet wide, and is deep enough to be used by small vessels.

The Spree joins with the Havel river at a point well inside the present limits of the city. Both rivers were joined, long ago, to the Oder river by means of canals.

The best known street in Berlin is "Unter den Linden." It is only about a mile long, but is very wide, about 150 feet. It is famed for the public buildings which line either side of it, or which, at least, were there before bombing started in the second World war.

Chaplin Case Retrial Will Begin Apr. 4

HOLLYWOOD—(U.P.)—Retrial of Joan Barry's paternity charges against Charlie Chaplin has been scheduled to begin Apr. 4.

Attorneys for both sides agreed Monday to change the date from May 2, originally set as the starting time.

The court ordered a retrial of the suit after a jury failed to agree.

Vilas County Fire Kills Man, Wife, Girl, 11

EAGLE RIVER, Wis.—(U.P.)—The body of Al Rounds, Conover township, Vilas county, was recovered late Monday from the smoldering ruins of his tavern, 12 miles north of here.

Two other bodies were found earlier. They were identified as those of Mrs. Rounds and an 11-year-old girl, Lucille Meyers, who had been staying with the Rounds.

Cause of the fire was not determined. The building was demolished.
