Narragansett Park Clerks Vote on Union

PAWTUCKET, R. I.—(UP)—The 550 mutual clerks at Narragansett race track prepared today to vote within 10 days to choose a bargaining agent who may represent them in negotiations with the track management. The state labor relation board ordered the vote as an aftermath to a two-day strike early this month. The strike was caused by a jurisdictional dispute between the Independent Mutual Clerks' Guild and the AFL Office Employees' International Union. The clerks may choose either of the unions or vote for no union at all.

Investors Rush to Back 'Rep' Theater

NEW YORK—Dollars from places such as Algonquin, Ill., (Pop. 900); Zaleski, O., (375); Downingtown, Pa., (4,500) and Two Rivers, Wis., (10,000) are helping to create the American Repertory theater (ART) which will become the United States what the Old Vic Theater Co., currently visiting here, is to England.

The ART, which will begin operations next fall with some of the country's best-known players involved, set itself a goal of \$300,000 in stock subscriptions and is assured of reaching it since \$287,750 already has been subscribed. The \$300,000 will assure two seasons of operation no matter what happens.

These subscriptions are not just spare chickenfeed either. The minimum accepted is \$50 for half a share. One such investment was made by a soldier stationed in Iceland; another by a Toledo, O., nurse. Investors so far number 131, representing almost every state in the union, and 78 of them were totally unknown to those who originated the project. Many of the investors have no hope of seeing an ART production unless they journey to New York or to one of a few large key cities, when the troupe is on tour in 1947-48.

The caliber of the people involved has had much to do with this public response to so tricky a venture as repertory company. Players so far under contract are Eva Lee Gallienne and Margaret Webster, both of whom also will direct; Walter Hampden, Ernest Truex, June Duprez, Victory Jory, Philip Bourneuf, and Richard Waring. These top-drawer names and the lesser lights still to be engaged will be hired on a two-year basis and will draw the same money each week, regardless of how many plays they appear in or the size of their roles. Five of the six players to be given the first season have been chosen. The problem of renting a theater has not been solved.

In addition to the sale of stock, the ART also gives patrons' rights to any who make an outright contribution of \$5. So far \$20,915 has been received from this source and it is kept separate from the money of investors. Patrons get special tickets in seminars, etc. A training school and experimental productions are part of the ART plan.
