

'Nostalgia' - New Song Heard Over 'David Rose' Program

"Nostalgia" is the haunting title and theme of the David Rose original tonic poem which the young modern composer-conductor will play with his orchestra on "Holiday for Music" at 9:30 p. m. Wednesday over CBS.

Written to interpret the universal longing for something special, a moment, a face, a song—Rose calls it "everybody's theme song."

Lucille Ball, the jilted-haired star of screen, will set her wits to work on a movieland murder mystery as guest armchair detective for Ellery Queen's "Adventure of the Hollywood Murder Cases" at 6:30 p. m. Wednesday over CBS.

Fresh from the film capital Miss Ball rushed thru her new picture, "Easy to Love" with Van Johnson, to fly east with her husband, Desi Arnaz, who now is appearing with his South American orchestra at New York's Copacabana club.

Walter O'Keefe, "The Man on the Flying Trapeze," drops in for a visit with Bob Crosby at 8:30 p. m. Wednesday over CBS.

O'Keefe's first made Crosby with the Crosby family in the old days when he met up with brother Bing on a radio program which featured Crosby with "The Rhythm Boys."

Ferdinand H. LaGuardia, director of the UNRRA, and Sir John Orr, director of the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization, will participate in a special round table discussion of world food problems to be heard from the National Press club, Washington, D. C., at 9:30 p. m. Wednesday over MBS.

In a recent movie, director Archie Mayo tells us, it was necessary to establish the time, 1932. So behind the opening scenes a narrator explained:

"The year was 1932. One thousand mortgages a day were being foreclosed. Banks were closing on every corner. A man known as FDR was soon to enter the White House. . . ."

The big studio boss, looking at the rough cut for the first time, started screaming: "I will never allow that man's name, or even his initials, to be heard in one of my pictures. Take it out!"

So the narration was revised. When the studio boss returned to see the revised version, the narrator read:

"The year was 1932. One thousand mortgages a day were being foreclosed. Banks were closing on every corner. President Herbert Hoover was about to leave the White House. . . ."

"That does it," said the studio boss, enthusiastically. And that's the way the picture was released.

Tigers With Teeth A motion picture we are eagerly awaiting, because it will be different, is "Man-Eaters of Kumaon," based on Jim Corbett's book about tiger-hunts in India's jungles. Corbett, an official hunter for the British government, combines, as James Hilton so aptly put it, "the skill of a matador with the motives of a Galahad."

Monty Shaff, who helped Charles R. Rogers produce "The Powers Girl" before he went into the Army in 1942, will film the picture entirely on location in India. The company's headquarters will be at Gwalior, a former B-29 airbase 12,000 miles from Hollywood and Vine.

Shaff will feature only two humans—the white hunter and a native girl. They'll probably be unknowns. Filming will start in October, after the monsoon season.

"They tried to sell me Lower California as a great place to film the picture," Shaff said, "but I think its success depends on authenticity. I want tigers with teeth—not from a circus cage."

Foot-Propelled To Fame Frank Loesser, the fellow who wrote all those hit war-songs ("They're Either Too Young or Too Old," "Praise the Lord and Pass the Ammunition," "What Do You Do in the Infantry?" and the ballad called "Rodger Young") is back writing songs for Hollywood movies.

Frank explains his success as a cinema tunesmith by saying that it all began because he was an annoyance.

"I was living next door to Lou Irwin, the agent, in New York. I made so much noise all day long, turning out songs, that he became desperate. One day a talent scout came to visit him, and Lou said, 'Take that guy back to Hollywood with you—do anything, but just get him out of here.' And he did."

Vets Pick Group To Study Bonus

COLUMBUS, May 22—(INS)—A committee to study the question of a bonus to veterans of World War II was established today by the War Veterans Clubs of Ohio.

The committee, headed by former Lt. Gov. Paul M. Herbert, will report its findings to the organization's annual convention in Columbus June 14-16, it was announced by President Henry Wolcum of Ironton. The committee to be chosen by Herbert will include veterans of both world wars.

If the committee report is adopted by the convention, it will be turned over to the Republican state central committee as a possible basis for a veterans' plank in the state party platform, Wolcum stated.

Wolcum also named Hayden Edwards, Columbus, as chairman of a committee on GI housing, and Francis Kearns, Columbus, to head a committee on surplus property.

Albino, Kangaroo Mice Have Pink Eyes, Feet

COLLINS, May 22—(AP)—Three mice described as albino kangaroo, a rare species, attracted interest in this section today.

The mice have pink eyes, feet, ears and tails and hop about on their rear legs like kangaroos. They were found in a nest by L. W. Weidman, manager of an elevator here.

Three kangaroo mice of ordinary grey color also were found in the nest.

2 Trustees Stroll From Prison Farm

LONDON, May 22—(INS)—The walkway of two trustees at the London prison farm was reported today by Supl. William F. Amrine.

The escapees are James Ferguson, 44, formerly of Batavia, serving a one-to-20 year forgery sentence, and Clarence Siders, 33, Gallipolis, serving one to five years for daytime housebreaking.

Injuries Fatal To Actor's Wife

HOLLYWOOD, May 22—(INS)—Funeral arrangements were pending today for Mrs. David Niven, fatally injured in a fall at Screen Star Tyrone Power's home.

Actor Niven's blonde wife, the former Pimula Rolla, died in St. John's hospital, Santa Monica, after plunging 20 feet down a cellar stairway Sunday night while participating in a party game with other guests, including many movie personalities.

A W.A.F. officer in her native Britain during the war, Mrs. Niven had arrived in the United States only six weeks ago with her two children, David J., 3 and James Graham, 6 months.

She was rushed to the hospital after preliminary examination by a physician at Power's home, and at first was believed recovering. Late Monday night, however, she took a turn for the worse and Niven, a British colonel during the war, was called to her bedside. She died early yesterday.

Mout Vesuvius near Naples, Italy, has been active off and on ever since Dec. 16, 1931, when it erupted and killed an estimated 18,000 people.
