Mayor Vetoes Boost of \$3,500 for Himself

WORCESTER, Mass. — Mayor Charles F. Jeff Sullivan has vetoed a proposed pay boost for himself.

The city council passed an order directing the city solicitor to ask for state legislation enabling the mayor's salary to be increased from \$7,500 to \$11,000 annually.

In vetoing the measure, Mayor Sullivan said the time was "neither opportune nor proper" to take such a step. He said that if the salary increase were made effective in January, 1950, he would approve it.

Hey! Lucille's 'Gang' Invited to Reunion

LAWTON, Okla. — (U.P.) — Former members of Lucille Henderson's "gang," living in most of the 48 states as well as Mexico and Canada, have been invited to return here Aug. 2 for the group's second annual reunion.

The "gang" was started during the war when Lucille opened her home to provide recreation and a "home away from home" for Ft. Sill soldiers. More than 50 ex-members returned last year for the first reunion.
