

# Hundreds Perish in Turkey Flood

ISTANBUL, Turkey, Feb. 21. (AP) Capt. Inoye, Japanese commander of the "Wild Tigers," has been captured by the Indonesian Army in Sumatra and is awaiting trial on charges that his private army killed hundreds of civilians since 1945, an official of the Indonesian republic said today.

## Fleet Units Off for Mock Battle

DETROIT, Feb. 21. (UPI) Units of the U. S. Fleet based at China and the Hawaiian Islands steamed out to sea today for extensive maneuvers and a mock battle.

Two light cruisers, an aircraft carrier and 12 destroyers will take part.

Vice Adm. Charles Cooke, commander of U. S. Naval forces in the western Pacific, will be in command of the light cruisers Tepuka and Duluth, and eight destroyers. Task Force 38 from Pearl Harbor, commanded by Rear Adm. Harold M. Martin, will send the carrier Valley Forge and four destroyers. The ships are scheduled to rendezvous somewhere between Okinawa and Hong Kong for the exercises.

CHICAGO, Feb. 21. (UPI) Two damage suits of \$125,000 against 17 policemen charging false arrest and brutality in connection with the investigation of the Suzanne Degnan murder two years ago, has been settled for \$20,000 by Hector Verburgh, 65, a janitor and his wife.

The defendants included Police Commissioner John C. Prendergast, Chief of Detectives Walter Storms, and Capt. Raymond Crane, chief of uniformed police.

Verburgh had charged he was treated brutally by policemen while being questioned about the abduction and dismemberment of the 6-year-old Degnan girl who had been kidnapped from her home. Her body was dismembered in a basement of an apartment building at which Verburgh was janitor.

The crime later was confessed by William G. Heirens, a University of Chicago student, who now is serving a series of life sentences for the Degnan slaying and two others.

DETROIT, Feb. 21. (UPI) The publishers of the novel "Rainbow County," say the winner of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer's \$125,000 novel prize is not "1066 pages of rank obscenity, blasphemy and sacrilege" as charged by a Fordham University professor.

Instead, Houghton Mifflin Company, said in a statement last night, the Ross Lockridge Jr., novel "is to give the world a legend on moral and spiritual regeneration in an era when hatred and materialism appear to be enveloping the world—or much of it—in fear and irreligious despair."
