CHICAGO—(U.P.)—A new chemical which keeps foods such as pastries and potato chips fresh up to 50 times as long as when no preservative is used has been developed at the University of Chicago. The product, discovered by the American Meat Institute foundation at the university, helps to preserve all products made with lard and other animal fats.

Cultural Concern Finds Cultured Bugs Useful

CLEVELAND—(U.P.)—To most persons bugs are a nuisance, but Dow Chemical Co. deliberately raises them. The firm breeds a special kind of bug because the tiny forms of life eat an industrial waste material which chemists can't destroy in any other way. The concern had difficulty getting rid of phenolic waste materials. Phenol is used in making varnish, plastics and drugs. After going through various manufacturing processes, the waste material came out in such diluted liquid form that it couldn't be removed, yet even small amounts of it would contaminate a river or a lake. Scientists solved the problem when they discovered bacteria which devour phenolic wastes and thrive on them. Dow now grows enough of the bugs to consume several thousand pounds of the waste a day.

Long Prison Terms Lack Meaning in Tennessee

NASHVILLE, Tenn.—(U.P.)—The Tennessee jury may say "99 years," "life imprisonment," or some other stiff sentence, but state prison records show that the "average" Tennessee convict is free after five years. A survey showed that only 13 prisoners had served more than 20 years and that the oldest in point of prison time had been behind bars since 1921. However, only six of the 13 had been in prison continuously since they first were admitted. The seven others had been freed but brought back either for new crimes or for parole violation.
