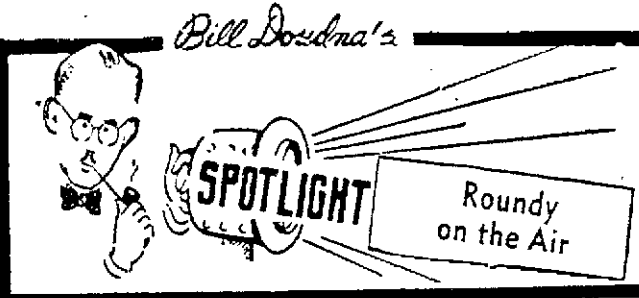


Season's Over? So What?
