Bill Doudna's SPOTLIGHT The Friedlanders Ernst Friedlander, cellist, and Marie Friedlander, pianist, opened the University of Wisconsin's centennial music festival Sunday night with a sonata recital which a small music hall audience found thoroughly enjoyable.

Feature of the program was the first American performance of Max Reger's "Sonata, Opus 28," a most listenable work which brought Mr. and Mrs. Friedlander back for four bows. Never spectacular, it nevertheless demands clear-cut tones, technical agility, and a sense of the dramatic. This demands the Friedlanders met, particularly in the energetic and somewhat heroic opening movement and the singing intermezzo—almost a serenade.

The festival will continue Wednesday at 8 p. m. with the Pro Arte quartet and assisting artists and Saturday at 8 p. m. with a festival concert by more than 500 students participating.
