NEW YORK. (AP) Vice President Barkley's appearance in the Ted Mack amateur hour (radio version) the night of Feb. 2 on ABC is expected to develop a "Congressional Amateur Night."

Much of the talent will be supplied by members of Congress in one capacity or another. Mrs. Barkley also is to join in the program, which is co-operating in opening the 1950 campaign of the American Heart Association.

The show will come from Washington where it is to be part of a two-hour local presentation. Although the radio version is separate from the television show on NBC-TV Tuesday nights, there is a possibility this production may be a special telecast.
