



When the phonograph and the radio became popular, the Weltes were forced into other musical projects and the valuable rolls were almost

forgotten.
During World War II the Welt factory was demolished. The rolls were saved by an engineer, however, who wrapped them carefully and hid them in a barn in the Black forest.
