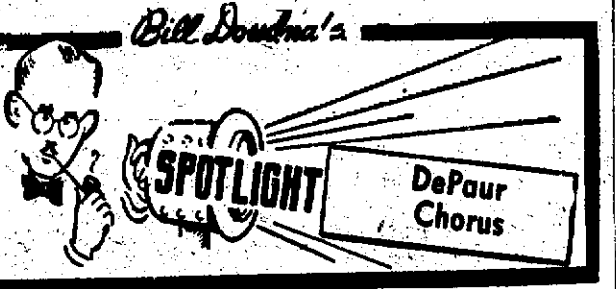

STORY: Regina Forbes (Barbara Stanwick) writes a column for 40 million people. She vents enough of her spleen, via the column, on Mike Brannan (Clark Gable) to bar him from midget car racing.
But the Brannan charm draws her in, she falls in love, and begins rooting for Mike to win the Indianapolis Speedway race. The conflict is in Mike's ruthless driving versus Regina's refined way of cutting a man off at the shoulders.

But most important was the choral work, which ranged through intricate rhythms and unusual harmonies, marching bands and Bach chorales with easy adjustment.

Special attention should go to the impressionistic "Deep Wet Moss" and rapid-fire "Crazy Medicine," the extraordinary guitar effect with which the chorus accompanied Hines in "Corrido de Cananea"; the haunting plianissimo of "Chinese Soldier's Elegy," and the sturdy basses, rivaling those of the Don Cossacks, in "Salvation is Created."

To insistent demands, the chorus responded with three encores—"Hoopdi Femitul," the air force version of "The Whiffenpoof Song," based on the Infantry's tradition of singing out its gripes while marching.

PARKING: At the concert, the University of Wisconsin faculty committee on parking passed out questionnaires asking motorists whether they would be interested in a plan under which they would park on concert nights at S. Mills and Spring sts. and ride buses between the lot and the theater.

HIGH POINTS: Better call the drawing room comedy a middle point where Mike draws Regina out on her awakening love for him.
LOW POINTS: Too much Gable mugging to blurred backgrounds of other racing cars. Could be shortened greatly without hurting a plausible plot.
VERDICT: Gable's back and Stanwick's got him. Mix the two in any kind of a story and it's worth your money.
