TIP O' THE MORNING: Wisconsin visitors to Chicago night clubs will find two familiar names on the billing - Banjo King Eddie Peabody at the Bismarck hotel's Swiss Chalet and Pianist Walter Liberace at the Palmer house's Empire room.

Color woodcuts by Antonio Frasconi, Uruguayan artist, and drawings, lithographs, and etchings by Frank Moulton, Madison, are being shown here this month.

The Frasconi exhibition is at the Madison Free Library, where it will be on public view from 9 a. m. to 9 p. m. daily except Sunday through Nov. 18.

Moulton's works are at the University club, and will be up through Nov. 30. Among them are pencil drawings made in Chile; ink drawings done for 'Through the Windshield' - book published by Moulton and Harold E. McClelland of the State Journal; lithographs of Peru and Chile, and etchings of Chile.

Outstanding in the Frasconi show are two large woodcuts printed on cloth. The Madison Art assn., sponsor of the show, says:

"Antonio Frasconi was born of Italian parents in Montevideo, Uruguay, in 1919 and received his education there. He held his first one-man show in that city at the age of 20, and his works were included in annual exhibitions at the Salon Municipal and the Salon Nacional de Bellas Artes there. He came to the United States in 1945 to work at the Art Students League and later was given a scholarship to study at the New School.

"In 1946 Frasconi held his first one-man show in the United States at the Brooklyn museum and since then he has given many exhibitions, including the Santa Barbara museum, the Pasadena Art Institute, the New School for Social Research, the Philadelphia Art Alliance, and the Pan American Union in Washington, D. C.

"He is represented in the permanent collections of the Museo Municipal in Montevideo, the Museum of Modern Art, the Brooklyn Museum, Princeton University, the Fogg Museum, the University of Michigan and the New York Public Library, the Santa Barbara museum, and the Rhode Island School of Design.

"Frasconi is considered a master technician in the field of woodcuts and he has invented many interesting variations of the medium."
