Twins Put in Complaint



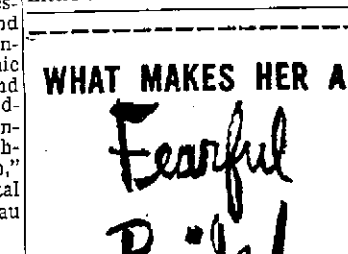

Women's Clubs Urge Anti-Narcotics Fight

WASHINGTON (AP) — The General Federation of Women's Clubs asked all its member units Sunday to work for city ordinances requiring a six-month quarantine of narcotics addicts. Mrs. Hiram Cole Houghton, federation president, wrote to each club president: "Narcotic addiction could be stamped out by quarantining present addicts in hospitals, as we quarantine for smallpox. Each addict causes perhaps four other persons to become addicts, and so these four make sixteen, and so on, until the situation pyramids out of control." Mrs. Houghton also urged back-legislation pending in congress to stiffen penalties for drug peddling.

Rescuers Find Body of Trapped Miner, 38

KEEWATIN, Minn.—(UP)—Rescue workers found the body of 38-year-old William Torvinen Sunday under tons of rocks and debris in a mine cave where he was trapped when the roof collapsed. Torvinen's body was found at 12:45 p. m. and brought to the surface of the 200-foot mine about 20 minutes later. The body was found about 30 feet inside the cave. Torvinen's 22-year-old wife, Melvina, is under doctor's care. Rescue crews have been working steadily since Friday noon in an attempt to reach Torvinen, who along with four other miners, were working in the cave when it collapsed. Three escaped and the fourth was rescued after three hours of frantic digging by other miners.
