Movie Colleagues Skip Actor's Rites

OGDEN, Utah—(U.P.)—The body of Robert Walker was placed on public view Monday night—prior to burial today—but none of the 32-year-old film star's Hollywood colleagues was known to be here for the rites.

Walker died suddenly last Tuesday night of a respiratory failure following the injection of a sedative by a specialist who had been treating him for an emotional disturbance.

It was to have been buried in Hollywood's famed Forest Lawn cemetery but his father, Ogden banker Horace Walker, ordered the body returned to his son's native Utah for quiet services here and burial in the family plot in Washington Heights park.

The funeral early this afternoon at an Ogden funeral home will follow the simple pattern laid down by the Latter-Day Saints (Mormon) church.

Charles Trezona, Jr., business manager for the former \$100,000-a-year star, said that as far as he knew none of the actors or actresses with whom Walker worked during his Hollywood career would be present.

Walker's former actress-wife, Jennifer Jones, paid her homage last week. Then she and her sons—Robert, 11, and Michael, 10—left for Europe with her present husband, Producer David O. Selznick.

51 Beauties Vie for Title of 1951 Queen

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J.—(U.P.)—Fifty-one beautiful girls arrived here Monday with bathing suits and evening gowns to vie for the title of "Miss America of 1951" and the \$50,000 which goes with it.

The beauties came from 44 states, Canada, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico. Anita Ekberg, "Miss Sweden of 1951," came too, but will not participate in the contest, which is limited to entries from the United States and possessions and territories.

Some of the contestants were late in arriving because rain delayed their airplanes, but they were all set to knuckle down to the beauty business.

They registered at the Haddon-Hall hotel, the contest headquarters. Monday night they were briefed in "Miss America" etiquette.

The chief features of the rules of the show is that the girls cannot speak to any man from Monday night until the queen is crowned next Saturday night.

This includes fathers, brothers, and even newsmen.

The new "Miss America" will receive a \$5,000 scholarship to develop whatever talents she exhibits during the contest. Many girls sing. Some recite poetry. One plays the bassoon.

The winner also will receive \$4,000 in cash and contracts for numerous personal appearances during the year she is the nation's reigning beauty.

Contest officials figure the winner will gross \$50,000 a year.

Tuesday afternoon, the entries ride down Atlantic City's famous boardwalk on elaborate floats in the annual parade of beauty.

Judging starts Wednesday night. Each girl must compete in three categories—swim suit, evening gown, and talent. One third of the contestants will appear Wednesday night and the others Thursday and Friday night.

Two Big Storms Stir Caribbean



Hurricane 'Dog' Heads for Jamaica

MIAMI, Fla.—(U.P.)—One hurricane raced across the Caribbean sea Monday and threatened the Dominican republic and Haiti with its 100-mile-an-hour winds while another big storm boiled up in its wake 1,500 miles behind.

The San Juan, Puerto Rico, weather bureau advised hurricane warnings hoisted from Punta San Luis westward to the southwest coast of Haiti on the mountainous island of Hispaniola.

Threatens Cuba Again Hurricane "Dog," the front-running storm and the fourth of the year, was traveling at the fast clip of 20 to 25 miles an hour and had turned in a more northwesterly direction, threatening also already storm-drunk Jamaica and Cuba if it keeps its present course.

The hurricane was located 130 miles south-southeast of Cabo Beata, Dominican republic, and 1,000 miles southeast of Miami.

"All ships and other interests in the area are urged to take precaution against this dangerous hurricane," the 5 p. m. advisory warned. "It has increased in size and intensity."

Hurricane "Easy," which was spawned overnight 1,100 miles east of the Windward islands, was also believed moving in a westward or northwesterly direction, although now some 2,100 miles from the U. S. mainland.

100 MPH Winds Hurricane "Charlie," which battered Jamaica last month and took 254 lives on that British island, passed a little south of the present course of hurricane "Dog."

The coffee and tobacco growing country of Dominican republic was not hit by that storm.

"It has winds of 100 miles an hour near the center in the northern semi-circle and hurricane winds extend outward from the center 125 miles to the north and 40 miles to the south," the advisory said.

Hurricane "Dog" was expected to continue its west-northwestward or northwesterly movement at about 20 miles an hour during the next 12 hours with "continued increase
