KNBH to Telecast Dance Music From Remote Spots

HOLLYWOOD. In line with practices followed by independent radio and networks in the early days, and still going up strong KNBH, Channel (4), is starting a series of live dance band remotes as their Tversion of the radio feature. The remotes will presently be on a show case basis, in order to determine popularity among living room armchair dancers, will emanate from the world famous dine and dance spot, the Hollywood Palladium.

Last Wednesday, KNBH took a sneak into the ballroom, with all their equipment, and without too much fanfare, put this type of show to a half-hour trial.

With the ever popular Ray Anthony aggregation (voted America's favorite band by Billboard's disc jockey poll for 1951 last week) generally cutting up, and our boy, Johnny Grant, mikeside, the program proved to be very entertaining.

Ray's first big time break came when he signed with Capitol records three years ago, and with the "ever-lovin'" assistance from the nation's disc jockeys, Ray Anthony soon became a top name.

Tonight at 8 o'clock over KNBH a full hour of this group will be featured in music, songs and gags, aided and abetted by (here's that name-again) Johnny Grant. This will be the first real "showcase test" for this type of programming of the band remote nature, and will probably be a contributing factor for this type of show's feature. If it is possible to arrange, "name-act-stars" will appear to help keep the pace so necessary for good entertainment.

Answer to Question No. 1. Yes. We owe confirmation of this remarkable discovery to that amateur "psychologist," gentleman and gambler, Frank Costello. He was quoted as stating to the Kefauver Crime Com-

mittee: "There are days when my mind don't function." The researches of other psychologists had previously shown that this was true.

Owing to the long life of the parents this left only 371,000 orphans but, had the parents died as early as they did in 1900 we would have had more than twice as many orphans to care for. So there is an increasing compensation for the high number of old folks to take care of.

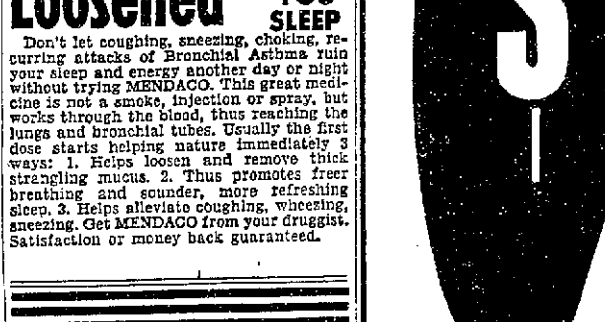
