

FULFILLING the promise he showed four years ago, George London made a most success? London made a most successful concert appearance Tuesday night in the Wisconsin Union theater.

In 1947, the bass-baritone was here as a member of the Bel Canto trio, whose other singers were Mario Lanza, tenor, and Frances Yeend, soprano. Then, he impressed concert-goers as a young man to be watched, as much for the sincerity and seriousness of his approach to his music as for his voice.

He has reached a point at which many singers would be willing to level off, but his performance Tuesday night indicated, that good as he is, he has not reached the summit of his career and intends to keep climbing.

A member of the Metropolitan Opera Co., he sang more arias than most of the opera folk who give concerts. After two seriousalmost forbidding-Handel works, which gave him a chance to show his excellent diction, his control, and his full-hadied tone, and a group

of Wolf songs, he came with two Mozart arias in a comic vein, They were "Madamina," from "Don Glovanni," and (as an encore) "Non Piu Andrai," from "The Marriage of Figaro," He sang them with the spirit of fun with which Mozart endowed them, and in a later encore gave Gershwin's "It Ain't Necessarily So" the same treatment

In the Wolf group, there were touches of cynical humor in "Der Musikant" and "Der Tambour" and solemn, pure beauty in "Gesang

Weyla's." An appealing Spanish group, including a quiet carol and a lively dance, and a foursome of folk songs completed the program. In these, London's one weakness appeared-a faltering in the sustained tones of low volume. He seemed to have a slight cold, which would account

for this. Other encores were "Tres Morillas," a Spanish tune; "I Wonder As I Wander," and "Or Man River."

London will sing an entirely different program in the same theater at 8 tonight. It will include ariss and songs by Brahms, Massenet, Moussorgsky, Strauss, Saint-Saens, Lully, and others, as well as an American group.

Good seats will be on sale at the theater boxoffice beginning at noon today.




