Tito Says He Hopes to Visit London Soon

BLEED, Yugoslavia (U. S. — Yugoslav's Marshal Josip Broz Tito hopes to visit London soon.

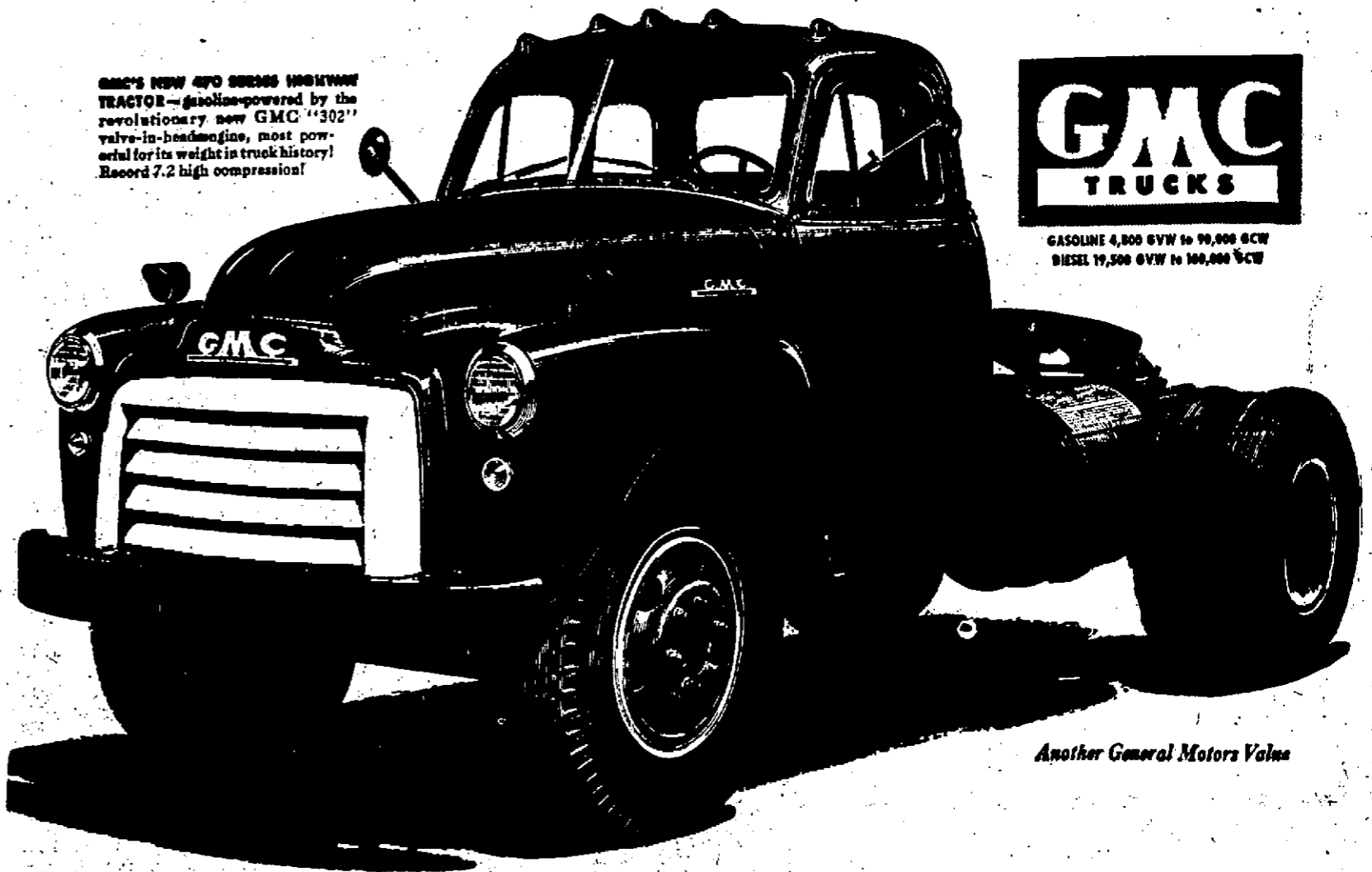
