

TIP OF THE MORNING: Nancy (ex-Milwaukee) Olson has been recalled from vacation to co-star with Will Rogers, Jr., in "The Boy from Oklahoma" at the Warner studios.

WITH VIRGINIA DRAKE, soprano, as soloist, the Madison String Sinfonia offered a pleasant concert Sunday at Scanlan hall. Marie A. Endres led her musicians in two performances of the happily varied program.

The Sinfonia is unique in this part of the country—the only organization around here devoting itself to music for strings, either written that way or transcribed for string orchestra. Most of Sunday's concert was the latter.

The opening number, "Sarabande et Tambourin," by the 18th century's Leclair, gave the program a stimulating start, with the musicians on their toes for a remarkably sonorous performance of the slow, stately sarabande, and a sparkling one of the lively second part.

Another outstanding piece of work was in a 17th century work by Cesti, as transcribed by Stokowski. Here the orchestra played with intensity, strength, and excellent coloring. These factors extended, with the addition of an appreciation of musical humor, to the "Polka" from Shostakovich's "The Age of Gold."

A Brahms excerpt also was well done (and repeated as an encore), but in two Bach arrangements the Sinfonia needed a more nearly absolute unison than it could pro-

duce—at least at the matinee. Incidentally, the afternoon audience was one of the least demonstrative I've seen in long, long time; the orchestra deserved much more applause than it got.

Miss Drake's group of short songs with Olive Colman's piano accompaniment was a delightful offering. Her lyric voice was practically perfect for them, with just enough dramatic quality to enhance "The April Hill" and "Joy." But her voice—otherwise satisfying—was a little light for her two arias.

NEWS FROM GERMANY: One of Munich's most beautiful sculptures, Hubertus fountain, is being restored and will be erected on Maximilian square. An important work of Adolf von Hildebrand, the fountain originally was on the terrace in front of the National museum.

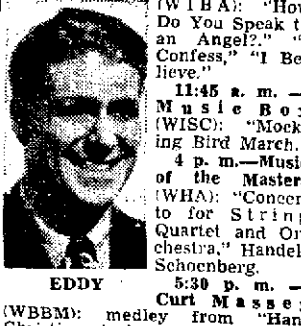

## JACOBY ON BRIDGE

When today's hand was dealt in the recent World Championship Match in New York, the American team bid the North-South cards with great simplicity and accuracy. North's double raise showed strong trump support of at least four cards in a hand that contained a count of 13 to 16 points. Actually North had only 11 points in high cards, and 1 point for the doubleton. Perhaps North counted 1 point extra for the ace of his partner's bid suit, or perhaps North felt that the double raise best expressed the nature of his hand in spite of the fact that he was 1 point short of the "correct" total.

South was equally direct in his next bid. He had a count of 20 points in high cards, 2 points for the two doubletons, and 1 point extra for the fifth card in spades. With a total of 23 points in his own hand and the assurance of 13 to 15 points in his partner's hand, South's only question was

Whether to bid a small or a grand slam. Since the American team avoids bidding grand slams except when badly in need of points, South went right to the small slam without bothering to explore the possibilities of a grand slam. The contract was, of course, easily fulfilled. Declarer took the first trick in dummy with the ace of hearts, drew trumps, and eventually ruffed his fourth diamond in dummy. One heart trick was given up to the enemy. In the other room, the Swedish team made complicated bids that seemed to have no-clear meaning. As a result, they missed the lay-down slam. South opened with one spade, as in the first room, but North's response was two clubs. The Swedish South bid three diamonds, and his partner jumped to four spades. This may have sounded very scientific, but it was far from clear. South passed, and thus missed the slam.

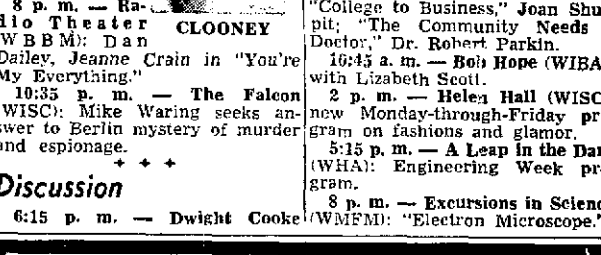
