UN Unanimous in Move to Oust 'Bandits' in Burma

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UP)—With East and West voting together for the second time in a week, the United Nations demanded Wednesday that the 12,000 Chinese Nationalist irregulars in Burma lay down their arms and leave the country or submit to internment.

The vote, taken in the general assembly's political committee, was 58 to zero with the rival sides in the dispute, Burma and Nationalist China, abstaining. The decision is certain to be finally ratified when it comes to a vote in the full assembly, probably today.

It was the second time in a week that the Soviet bloc has voted with the West on a major international problem. The assembly last week agreed unanimously to confine trade talks to Panmunjom.

The resolution approved Wednesday called on Chiang Kai-shek's government to do what it can to bring about disarmament, and internment or withdrawal, of the Nationalist irregulars. To this end, it called for continuation of the American-guided negotiations between the Formosa regime and the Burmese.

The Formosa regime admits "influence" but denies "control" over the nondescript Chinese armies, which took refuge in Burma when the Communists overran China.
